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

Pleading, Practice, Evidence, Absolute Rights of Persons, (General Status) Law of Torts, and Damages.

#### JOHN PRENTISS POE,

A. B. Princeton 1854; A. M. 1857.

Mr. Poe will lecture to the INTERMEDIATE CLASS on Pleading, Absolute Rights of persons (General Status), and Torts: Text Book, Poe on Pleading. Reference Books, Cooley's Elements of Torts; Bigelow on Torts.

He will lecture to the SENIOR CLASS on Practice, Evidence and Damages: Text Books, Poe on Practice; Reynolds' Theory of Evidence. Reference Books, Underhill on Evidence; Greenleaf on Evidence; Sedgwick's Elements of Damages.

#### Constitutional Law, Interpretation and General Jurisprudence.

#### RICHARD M. VENABLE.

A. B. Hampden Sydney 1857; A. M. 1859; Graduate of University of Va. 1859 and 1860; LL. B. Washington and Lee University 1868; LL. D. Hampden Sidney 1888.

#### Law of Personal Property, Bailments, Contracts, Quasi-Contracts, Sales and Suretyship.

#### WILLIAM T. BRANTLY.

#### A. B. Mercer University 1871; A. M. 1874; LL. B. University of Md. 1874.

Mr. Brantly will lecture to the JUNIOR CLASS on Personal Property, Bailments, Contracts, Sales and Suretyship: Text Books, 2 Kent's Commentaries, Anson on the Law of Contract, and Chalmers' Sale of Goods Act. Reference Books, Hoffcut and Woodruff's American Cases on Contracts, Benjamin on Sales and Brantly on Contracts.

#### Real Property and Leasehold Estates, Patents, Trade Marks and Copyrights.

Mr. Baer will lecture to the JUNIOR CLASS on *Real and Lease*hold Estates: Text Book, Tiedeman on Real Property. Reference Books, Venable's Syllabus of the Law of Real Property; Williams on Real Property; 2 Blackstone's Commentaries.

He will lecture to the INTERMEDIATE CLASS on Title to Real Property and Conveyancing: Text and Reference Books, the same; and on Patents, Trade Marks, and Copyrights: Books to be announced.

Judge Ritchie will lecture to the INTERMEDIATE CLASS on Agency, Partnership, Carriers, and Shipping: Text Book, Pomeroy's Smith's Mercantile Law.

#### JOSEPH C. FRANCE.

Graduate Baltimore City College 1879; J. H. U. 1880-81; LL. B. University of Maryland 1883.

Mr. France will lecture to the INTERMEDIATE CLASS on the Law of Corporations, with special reference to Municipal and Railroad Corporations, and on Bills and Notes\*: Text Books, to be announced.

\*At the request of Mr. France, and with the consent of the Faculty, Edgar A. Poe, Esq. lectured on Bills and Notes during the last Session.

#### International Law, Conflict of Laws; Admiralty and Insurance. HENRY STOCKBRIDGE.

A. B. Amherst 1877; LL. B. University of Maryland 1878. One of the Judges of the Supreme Bench of Baltimore City.

Judge Stockbridge will lecture to the INTERMEDIATE CLASS on Insurance: Reference Book, Joyce on Insurance.

He will lecture to the SENIOR CLASS on International Law: Text Book, Woolsey's Introduction to International Law; on the Conflict of Laws: Reference Book, Wharton on the Conflict of Laws; and on Admiralty: Reference Book, Benedict's Admiralty.

Method of Instruction.

Instruction will be given by *lectures*, *reading* and *catechising*. The *lectures* are intended to present all of the leading principles of the common law applicable to the subject, and the modification of the common law by statute; and to give illustrations of the applications of the common and statute law. Special attention is given to the statutes in force in Maryland, and to peculiarities of the law in that State, where there are such; but the reasons for these statutory modifications and local peculiarities are explained, so that the student may in a short time acquaint himself with the local peculiarities of the law in any State in which he may practice.

*Readings* from text books will be assigned on the subjects treated of in the lectures.

The *catechising* at each lecture will be on the subject discussed in the preceding lecture and on the assigned readings.

#### Library and Buildings.

The buildings of the several departments of the University of Maryland are all situated upon the corner of Lombard and Greene Streets, the Law School having removed to its new building there on the first of January, 1884. Connected with the lecture hall is a large and pleasant reading room and study for the use of students, containing a carefully selected library of text books upon the subjects embraced in the course of study, volumes of Leading Cases, the English Common Law, United States and Maryland Reports, Digests, Statutes, etc., as well as many of the modern and best works on American and English History and Politics. The tables are supplied with the prominent Law Reviews, and the library is annually growing in size and value by the addition of new volumes.

#### Classes and Duration of Course.

The students attending the School are divided into three classes—a Senior Class, an Intermediate Class and a Junior Class. The subjects of study in each class are:

#### JUNIOR CLASS.

First Term (Oct. to Feb.): Common Law (Elementary Law), Criminal Law and Domestic Relations.

Second Term (Feb. to June): Real Property, Personal Property, Bailments, Contracts, *Quasi-Contracts*, Sales and *Suretyship*.

#### INTERMEDIATE CLASS.

First Term (Feb. to Oct.): Real Property (Title and Conveyancing), Executors and Administrators, Pleading, and Torts, Insurance, and General Jurisprudence.

Second Term (Feb. to June): Agency, Partnership, Carriers, Shipping, Corporations, *Railroads*, Bills and Notes, and Pleading continued.

#### SENIOR CLASS.

First Term (Oct. to Feb.): Practice, Evidence, Damages, International Law, Conflict of Laws, Admiralty, and General Jurisprudence. Second Term (Feb. to June): Equity Jurisprudence and Procedure, Legal Ethics, Constitutional Law, and Interpretation.

The branches italicised in the above summary have been added to the curriculum for the first time as separate courses for the next session.

The lectures are all after 4 P. M. A schedule of their arrangement will be furnished at the beginning of the session.

It will be seen that the full course of study extends over three years, and the Faculty are satisfied that students who have not made considerable progress in the study of law do themselves and the Law School an injury by attempting to graduate in a shorter period. Where students can afford it, they should spend three years in the study of law. But in order to meet the case of those who cannot afford this, students are permitted to enter and take the examinations of more than one class during the same term, their fitness to complete the course in less than three years being determined by their ability to pass the regular examinations at the close of each term, and to comply with the other requirements for graduation. No student will, however, be permitted to complete the course in less than two years.

#### Examinations, Thesis and Degrees.

The Law School confers the degree of Bachelor of Laws on students who have attended the course of lectures to all three classes, have attained the required standard at the examinations, have submitted to the Faculty a satisfactory thesis, and argued the required number of cases in the Moot Court.

There are six examinations each session—two of the Senior Class, two of the Intermediate Class and two of the Junior Class. Each class has an examination at the close of each term. The examinations are by printed questions, to be answered in writing. Each examination is valued at 100. In order to graduate, the student must attain a grade of at least three-fourths on the questions propounded on each distinct subject at each examination. This requirement will be rigidly adhered to, and in marking all examination papers, grammar and composition will be taken into account. The subjects for the *thesis* for the next session will be given to the students in November, 1899, and they will be expected to hand them in to the Faculty by April 1, 1900. The attention of the students is called to the fact that the Faculty will require a high standard of excellence in the thesis.

The Faculty reserve to themselves the right to refuse a degree to any student writing an unsatisfactory thesis or neglecting the preparation and argument of the Moot Court cases, whatever grade he may have attained at the examinations.

#### Moot Court.

The Moot Court will meet once a week during the session and will be presided over by one of the professors.

At the beginning of each term the assignments in the Moot Court for that term will be announced and posted on the bulletin board in the reading-room, and statements of the cases to be argued will be furnished by the Secretary of the Faculty to the students who are to take part in the argument.

#### Prizes and Honorable Mention.

The Faculty will at the close of the session 1899-1900, award two prizes-

I. A prize of \$100 to that member of the graduating class attaining the highest grade in the six examinations.

At the close of the session 1898–99, this prize was awarded to William Milnes Maloy, of Baltimore, Md.

2. A prize of \$100 to that member of the graduating class who submits the best *thesis*.

At the close of the season 1898–99, this prize was awarded to William A. Wheatley, of Baltimore, Md., by a committee consisting of Messrs. Joseph Packard, Jr., Lewis Hochheimer and Richard S. Culbreth, of the Baltimore Bar, for a thesis upon "Power of the State, under the Police Power, to regulate Interstate Commerce."

All members of the graduating class who have attained an average grade of 95 in the six examinations will also be honorably mentioned in the order of their standing at the Commencement. SESSION AND TERMS.

The next session will commence on the first Monday of October (October 2) 1899 and will close June 1, 1900. There will be a short vacation from December 23, 1899, to January 2, 1900, inclusive. Lectures will be suspended on legal holidays and on Easter Monday.

The session is divided into *two lerms*. The *first term* extends from the beginning of the session to January 31, 1900, and the *second term* from February 1, 1900, to June 1, 1900.

#### COMMENCEMENT.

The Commencement will be held June 4, 1900, at 8 P. M.

#### **Opportunities for Attending Other Lectures.**

All the courses upon History and Politics at the Johns Hopkins University are open to law students upon the payment of very moderate fees, and are given at hours which do not interfere with the attendance upon the lectures at the Law School.

#### Privileges, Courts, etc.

Any student entered in one or two classes has the privilege, if he sees fit, to be present at the lectures in the other class or classes; and any graduate of the school has the privilege of attending all the lectures for the session next ensuing his graduation.

There are seven courts in almost continuous session in Baltimore during the entire scholastic year; the students have unusual opportunities to learn the law by attendance on the courts. Students are advised to attend the courts when they can conveniently do so, and to give careful attention and thought to the proceedings.

There is a Literary Society attached to the School, known as the Maryland University Debating Society, which is organized and conducted entirely by the students. Its discussions during the past session were usually interesting and instructive.

It has been the practice heretofore for students to form *Quiz Clubs*, composed of from five to ten members. They can, if properly conducted, be made very improving, and students are advised to form them.

#### Commencement.

The Annual Commencement for the session of 1898-99 took place in the Academy of Music at 8 P. M., June 5, 1899. Hon. John V. L. Findlay, of Baltimore, Maryland, delivered the annual address. Bernard Carter, Esq., Provost of the University, addressed the graduates in conferring the degrees, and the prizes were awarded by the Dean.

Fees and Expenses.

The fees for each term are payable *strictly in advance* at the commencement of each term.
