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

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



He will lecture to the JUNIOR CLASS on *Elementary Common* Law: Text Book, Robinson's Elementary Law.

International Law, Conflict of Laws; Admiralty, Insurance, and Bills and Notes.

Judge Stockbridge will lecture to the SENIOR CLASS on International Law: Text Book, Davis' Elements of International Law, Edition of 1900; on the Conflict of Laws: Text Book, Minor's Conflict of Laws; and on Admiralty: Reference Book, Brown's Illustrative Cases on Admiralty.

He will lecture to the INTERMEDIATE CLASS on Insurance: Reference Book, Joyce on Insurance; and on Bills and Notes: Text Book, Norton's Hand Book on Bills and Notes, 3d Edition.

Sales, Suretyship and Quasi-Contracts.

EDGAR ALLAN POE.

A. B. Princeton, 1891; A. M., 1894; L.L. B. University of Maryland, 1893.

Mr. Edgar Allan Poe will lecture to the JUNIOR CLASS on Sales, Suretyship and Quasi-Contracts: Text Books, Brantly on Contracts, Chalmer's Sale of Goods Act. Reference Books, Benjamin on Sales, Brantly on Suretyship. Instruction will be given by *lectures*, *reading and catechising*. The *lectures* are intended to present all the leading principles of the common law applicable to the subject, and the modification of the common law by statute; and to give illustrations of the applications of the common and statute law. Special attention is given to the statutes in force in Maryland, and to peculiarities of the law in that State, where there are such; but the reasons for these statuatory modifications and local peculiarities are explained so that the student may in a short time acquaint himself with the local peculiarities of the law in any State in which he may practice.

Readings from text books will be assigned on the subjects treated of in the lectures.

The *Catechising* at each lecture will be on the subject discussed in the preceding lecture and on the assigned readings.

Library and Buildings.

The buildings of the several departments of the University of Maryland are all situated upon the corner of Lombard and Greene Streets, the Law School having removed to its new building there on the first of January, 1884. Connected with the lecture hall is a large and pleasant reading-room and study, for the use of students, containing a carefully selected library of text books upon the subjects embraced in the course of study, volumes of Leading Cases, the English Common Law, United States and Maryland Reports, Digests, Statutes, etc., as well as many of the modern and best works on American and English History and Politics. The tables are supplied with the prominent Law Reviews, and the library is annually growing in size and value by the addition of new volumes.

Classes and Duration of Course.

The students attending the School are divided into three

classes—a Senior Class, an Intermediate Class and a Junior Class. The subjects of study in each class are:

JUNIOR CLASS.

First Term (Oct. to Feb.): Common Law (Elementary Law), Criminal Law and Domestic Relations.

Second Term (Feb. to June): Real Property, Personal Property, Bailments, Contracts, Quasi-Contracts, Sales and Suretyship.

INTERMEDIATE CLASS.

First Term (Feb. to Oct.): Real Property (Title and Conveyancing), Executors and Administrators, Pleading and Torts, Insurance and General Jurisprudence.

Second Term (Feb. to June): Agency, Partnership, Carriers, Shipping, Corporations, Railroads, Bills and Notes, and Pleading continued.

SENIOR CLASS.

First Term (Oct. to Feb.): Practice, Evidence, Damages International Law, Conflict of Laws, Admiralty, and General Jurisprudence.

Second Term (Feb. to June): Equity Jurisprudence and Procedure, Legal Ethics, Constitutional Law, and Interpretation.

The lectures are all after 4 P. M. A schedule of their arrangement will be furnished at the beginning of the session.

It will be seen that the full course of study extends over three years, and the Faculty are satisfied that students who have not made considerable progress in the study of law do themselves and the Law School an injury by attempting to graduate in a shorter period. Where students can afford it, they should spend three years in the study of law. But in order to meet the case of those who cannot afford this, students are permitted to enter and take the examinations of more than one class during the same term, their fitness to complete the course is less than three years being determined by their ability to pass the regular examinations at the close of each term, and to comply with the other requirements for graduation. No student will, however, be permitted to complete the course in less than two years.

Registration.

All students are required when entering for *each session* to report at the office in person and sign the register and procure tickets of admission to the lectures. The date of signing for each session will be noted and names not upon the register will not be placed upon the class rolls. The stipulated period of attendance upon the Law School for the purpose of graduation, and for insertion in the certificate required to take the examination for admission to the bar before the Board of State Law Examiners will be calculated from the register, and the class rolls made therefrom.

Examinations, Thesis and Degrees.

The Law School confers the degree of Bachelor of Laws on students who have attended the course of lectures to all three classes, have attained the required standard at the examinations, have submitted to the Faculty a satisfactory thesis, and argued the required number of cases in the Moot Court.

There are six examinations each session—two of the Senior Class, two of the Intermediate Class and two of the Junior Class. Each class has an examination at the close of each term. The examinations are oral or by printed questions, to be answered in writing. Each examination is valued at 100. In order to graduate, the student must attain a grade of at least three-fourths on the questions propounded on each distinct subject at each examination. This requirement will be rigidly adhered to, and in marking all examination papers, grammar and composition will be taken into account.

The subject for the *theses* for the next session will be given to the students in November, 1901, and they will be expected to hand them in to the Faculty by April 1, 1902. The attention of the students is called to the fact that the Faculty will require a high standard of excellence in the theses.

The Faculty reserve to themselves the right to refuse a degree to any student writing an unsatisfactory thesis or neglecting the preparation and argument of the Moot Court cases, whatever grade he may have attained at the examinations.

Moot Court.

The Moot Court will meet once a week during the session and will be presided over by one of the professors.

At the beginning of each term the assignments in the Moot Court for that term will be announced and posted on the bulletin board in the reading-room, and statements of the cases to be argued will be furnished by the Secretary of the Faculty to the students who are to take part in the argument.

Prizes and Honorable Mention.

The Faculty will at the close of the session 1901–1902, award two prizes—

1. A prize of \$100 to that member of the graduating class attaining the highest grade in the six examinations.

At the close of the session 1900-1901, this prize was awarded to Sidney L. Nyburg, of Baltimore, Md.

2. A prize of \$100 to that member of the graduating class who submits to the best *thesis*.

At the close of the session 1900–1901, this prize was awarded to Solomon Mendels, of Baltimore, Md., by a committee consisting of Messrs. Archibald H. Taylor, Henry Duffy and William H. Perkins, Jr., of the Baltimore Bar, for a thesis upon "The Law of Usage and Custom in Maryland."

All members of the graduating class who have attained an average grade of 95 in the six examinations will also be honorably mentioned in the order of their standing at the Commencement.

Calendar for Session, 1901-1902.

SESSION AND TERMS.

The next session will commence on the first Tuesday of October (October 1, 1901), and will close June 1, 1902. There will be a short vacation from December 21, 1901, to January 1, 1902, inclusive. Lectures will be suspended on legal holidays and on Easter Monday.

The session is divided into *two terms*. The *first term* extends from the beginning of the session to January 31, 1902, and the *second term* from February 1, 1902, to June 1, 1902.

COMMENCEMENT.

The Commencement will be held June 2, 1902, at 8 P. M.

Opportunities for Attending Other Lectures.

All the courses upon History and Politics at the Johns Hopkins University are open to law students upon the payment of very moderate fees, and are given at hours which do not interfere with the attendance upon the lectures at the Law School.

Privileges, Courts, etc.

Any student entered in one or two classes has the privilege, if he sees fit, to be present at the lectures in the other class or classes; and any graduate of the school has the privilege of attending all the lectures for the session next ensuing his graduation.

There are seven courts in almost continuous session in Baltimore during the entire scholastic year; the students have unusual opportunities to learn the law by attendance on the courts. Students are advised to attend the courts when they can conveniently do so, and to give careful attention and thought to the proceedings.

There is a Literary Society attached to the School, known as the Maryland University Debating Society, which is organized and conducted entirely by the students. Its discussions during the past session were usually interesting and instructive.

It has been the practice heretofore for students to form *Quiz Clubs*, composed of from five to ten members. They can, if properly conducted, be made very improving, and students are advised to form them.

Commencement.

The Annual Commencement for the session of 1900–1901 took place in the Academy of Music at 8 P. M., June 3, 1901. Rev. John Timothy Stone, Pastor of Brown Memorial Church, Baltimore, delivered the annual address. Bernard Carter, Esq., Provost of the University, addressed the graduates in conferring the degrees, and awarded the prizes.

Fees and Expenses.

The fees for each term are payable *strictly in advance* at the commencement of each term, and tickets of admission to the lectures are issued only on payment of fees.

The charges for instruction are as follows:

Students attending and taking the examinations of one class,

Students attending and taking the examinations of two classes during the same term,

> For Term of four months,\$ 50 For Session of eight months,100

Students attending and taking the examinations of any part of the course of a class will be charged the same rates as for the entire course.

There will be a Library fee of *four dollars* per annum for each student, and an additional charge of *ten dollars* to each graduate as a diploma fee.

Special arrangements may be made by members of the bar, or others, not regular students of the Law School, for attending any particular part or branch of instruction, at rates of charge in proportion to the above.

Board can be had in the city at prices varying from \$4 to \$10 per week.
