THE RESERVE AND ADDRESS OF THE RESERVE AND ADDRE

PLEADING, PRACTICE, EVIDENCE, ABSOLUTE RIGHTS OF PERSONS, (GENERAL STATUS), LAW OF TORTS AND DAMAGES.

JOHN PRENTISS POE.

A. B., Princeton, 1854; A. M., 1857; LL. D., Princeton, 1904.

Mr. Poe will lecture to the Intermediate Class on Pleading, Practice, Absolute Rights of Persons (General Status) and Torts: Text Book, Poe on Pleading and Practice. Reference Book, Cooley's Elements of Torts.

He will lecture to the Senior Class on Evidence and Damages: Text Book, Reynold's Theory of Evidence. Reference Books, Greenleaf on Evidence; Wigmore on Evidence; Sedgwick's Elements of Damages.

JURIDICAL EQUITY.

For twenty-two years Judge Charles E. Phelps held the Chair of Juridical Equity with great usefulness and distinction. He resigned at the end of the last session. The vacancy thus caused will be filled before the next session and lectures upon the *Principles of Equity Jurisprudence and Equity Procedure* will be delivered as usual to the Senior Class. INTERNATIONAL LAW, PUBLIC AND PRIVATE; CONFLICT OF LAWS, EXECUTORS AND ADMINISTRATORS.

CRIMINAL LAW AND INSURANCE.

W. CALVIN CHESNUT.

A. B., Johns Hopkins University, 1892; LL. B., University of Maryland, 1894.

Mr. Chesnut will lecture to the Junior Class on Criminal Law: Text Book, Clark on Criminal Law.

He will lecture to the Intermediate Class on Insurance: Reference Books, Vance, Kerr, or Elliot on Insurance.

AGENCY, PARTNERSHIP, CARRIERS AND SHIPPING. IAMES P. GORTER.

A. M., St. John's, 1887; LL. B., University of Maryland, 1881.

Mr. Gorter will lecture to the Intermediate Class on Agency, Partnership, Carriers and Shipping: Text Book, Huffcut on Agency. Reference Books, Mechem's Elements of Partnership; Goddard's Outlines of Bailments and Carriers.

General Jurisprudence and Legal Ethics.

JOHN J. DONALDSON.

Harvard, 1871; LL. B., University of Maryland, 1871.

Mr. Donaldson will lecture to the Senior Class on General Jurisprudence,* including origins, development, etc., of the law: Reference Books, Holland's Jurisprudence, Markby's Elements of Law, Clark's Practical Jurisprudence, Muirhead's Roman Law, Roby's Roman Private Law, Lightwood's Nature of Positive Law, Pollock and Maitland's History of the Common Law.

He will also lecture to the Senior Class on Legal Ethics: Text Book, Code adopted by State Bar Association.

*Richard M. Venable, Esq., after a distinguished service of thirty-two years, during which his instruction covered, at different times, the subjects of Real Property and Leasehold Estates, Title, Conveyancing, Torts, Constitutional and Statute Law and General Jurisprudence, finally retired in October last from the Chair of General Jurisprudence and from the Faculty.

JURISDICTION AND PROCEDURE OF THE FEDERAL COURTS; ADMIRALTY AND BANKRUPTCY.

JOHN C. ROSE.

Mr. Rose will lecture to the Senior Class on the Jurisdiction and Procedure of the Federal Courts, Admiralty and Bankruptcy: Text Books, Hughes' Hand Book of Jurisdiction and Procedure of the U. S. Court; and Hughes on Admiralty. Reference Book, Collier on Bankruptcy.

REAL PROPERTY AND LEASEHOLD ESTATES.

HERBERT T. TIFFANY.

A. B., Johns Hopkins University, 1882; LL. B., University of Maryland, 1885.

Mr. Tiffany will lecture to the Junior Class on Real Property and Leasehold Estates: Text Book, Tiffany on Real Property. Reference Books, Venable's Syllabus of the Law of Real Property; Williams on Real Property; 2 Blackstone's Commentaries.

TITLE TO REAL PROPERTY AND CONVEYANCING.

ELI FRANK.

A. B., Johns Hopkins University, 1894; LL. B., University of Maryland, 1896.

Mr. Frank will lecture to the Intermediate Class on Title to

Real Property and Conveyancing.

Text and Reference Books, Venable's Syllabus of the Law of Real Property; 2 Blackstone's Commentaries; Tiedeman on Real Property; and 2 Tiffany on Real Property.

METHOD OF INSTRUCTION.

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Instruction will be given by lectures, reading and catechising. The lectures are intended to present all the leading principles of the common law applicable to the subject, and the modification of the common law by statute; and to give illustrations of the applications of the common and statute law. Special attention is given to the statutes in force in Maryland, and to peculiarities of the law in that State, where there are such; but the reasons for these statutory modifications and local peculiarities are explained so that the student may in a short time acquaint himself with the local peculiarities of the law in any State in which he may practice.

Readings from text books will be assigned on the subjects treated of in the lectures.

The catechising at each lecture will be on the subject discussed in the preceding lecture and on the assigned readings.

LIBRARY AND BUILDINGS.

The buildings of the several departments of the University of Maryland are all situated upon the corner of Lombard and Greene Streets. Connected with the lecture hall is a large and pleasant reading-room and study, for the use of students, containing a carefully selected library of text books upon the subjects embraced in the course of study, volumes of Leading Cases, the English Common Law, United States and Maryland Reports, Digests, Statutes, etc., as well as many of the modern and best works on American and English History and Politics. The tables are supplied with the prominent Law Reviews, and the library is annually growing in size and value by the addition of new volumes.

CLASSES AND DURATION OF COURSE.

The students attending the School are divided into three classes a Senior Class, an Intermediate Class and a Junior Class.. The subjects of study in each class are:

JUNIOR CLASS.

First Term: Common Law (Elementary Law), Criminal Law and Domestic Relations.

Second Term: Real Property, Personal Property, Bailments, Contracts, Quasi-Contracts, Sales and Suretyship.

INTERMEDIATE CLASS.

First Term: Real Property (Title and Conveyancing), Executors and Administrators, Pleading and Torts, and Insurance.

Second Term: Agency, Partnership, Carriers, Shipping, Corporations, Railroads, Bills and Notes, Trademarks and Copyrights, and Practice.

SENIOR CLASS.

First Term: Evidence, Damages, International Law, Public and Private; Conflict of Laws, General Jurisprudence, and Legal Ethics.

Second Term: Equity Jurisprudence and Procedure, Constitutional Law and Interpretation, Jurisdiction and Procedure of the Federal Courts, Admiralty and Bankruptcy.

The lectures are all after 4 P. M. A schedule of their arrangement will be furnished at the beginning of the session.

It will be seen that the full course of study extends over three years, and the Faculty are satisfied that students who have not made considerable progress in the study of law do themselves and the Law School an injury by attempting to graduate in a shorter period. Where students can afford it, they should spend three years in the study of law. But in order to meet the case of those who cannot afford this, students are permitted to enter and take the examinations of more than one class during the same term, their fitness to complete the course in less than three years being determined by their ability to pass the regular examinations at the close of each term and to comply with the other requirements for graduation. No student will, however, be permitted to complete the course in less than two years.

REGISTRATION.

All students are required when enterining for each session to report at the office in person and sign the register and procure tickets of admission to the lectures. The date of signing for each session will be noted and names not upon the register will not be placed upon the class rolls. The stipulated period of attendance upon the Law School for the purpose of graduation, and for insertion in the certificate required to take the examination for admission to the bar before the Board of State Law Examiners, will be calculated from the register, and the class rolls made therefrom.

Examinations, Theses and Degrees.

The Law School confers the degree of Bachelor of Laws on students who have attended the course of lectures to all three classes, have attained the required standard at the examinations, have submitted to the Faculty a satisfactory thesis, and argued the required number of cases in the Moot Court.

There are six examinations each session—two of the Senior Class, two of the Intermediate Class and two of the Junior Class. Each class has an examination at the close of each term. The examinations are oral, or by printed questions to be answered in writing.

The examination books, returned by the students, will be marked, "Passed with distinction," when ninety per cent. or over of the questions propounded are correctly answered; "Passed with credit," when eighty per cent. or over are correctly answered; "Passed," when seventy-five per cent. or over are correctly answered; and "Failed," when less than seventy-five per cent. are correctly answered.

The subjects of study will be classified into major and minor subjects as follows:

- (a) Major Subjects: Domestic Relations; Personal Property and Contracts; Sales, Suretyship and Quasi-Contracts; Real Property; Pleading and Torts; Title and Conveyancing; Testamentary Law; Commercial Law and Shipping; Corporations; Evidence and Damages; Constitutional Law; and Equity.
- (b) Minor Subjects: Elementary Law; Criminal Law; Insurance; Bills and Notes; Practice; Copyrights and Trademarks; and International Law.

In order to graduate, a student must have obtained the passing grade on each distinct subject at each examination; but a student who has obtained the passing grade on all major subjects, and has failed on only one minor subject, may be graduated by a vote of the Faculty. In marking all examination papers, grammar and composition will be taken into account.

This system of marking went into effect with the class entering for the term beginning September 25th, 1905. The system of marking previously in effect will be continued for the class graduating in 1907.

The subjects for the theses for the next session will be given to the students in November, 1906, and they will be expected to hand them in to the Faculty by April 1, 1907. The attention of the students is called to the fact that the Faculty will require a high standard of excellence in the thesis.

The Faculty reserve to themselves the right to refuse a degree to any student writing an unsatisfactory thesis or neglecting the preparation and argument of the Moot Court cases, whatever grade he may have attained at the examinations.

PRELIMINARY EDUCATION.

In addition to the above-mentioned requirements, the Faculty will require of candidates for the degree of LL. B., who enter the Law School at the session beginning in the Fall of 1906, and thereafter, the completion of a High School course of study or its equivalent. The equivalent may be determined by the Faculty upon certificates issued under public authority or by the authorities of an The Faculty will consider that institution of advanced learning. students who have received the degree of A. B. from any reputable college or university, or certificate of graduation from any of the Normal or High Schools of the State of Maryland, or other reputable institution of a similar character, to be properly qualified. In the absence of such degrees or certificates, candidates for the degree of LL. B. must satisfactorily pass an examination in the ordinary studies required for graduation from the High Schools of this State, and particularly upon the following subjects:

- 1. English—Spelling, Grammar, Composition and Literature.
- 2. History—United States and English.
- 3. Mathematics—Arithmetic.
- 4. Science—Political Economy, and Physics or Geography.
- 5. Languages-Latin or French-at least two years' work.

The Faculty strongly recommends that students not qualified without this examination should take it before entering upon the study at the Law School, but the privilege is given to candidates

for degrees to take the examination in any September before graduation. The Faculty will hold one such examination each year, in the latter part of September, to be announced in the catalogue. The examination will be held September 24th and 25th of this year.

MOOT COURT.

The Moot Court will meet once a week during the session—generally on Friday evenings at 8 o'clock—and will be presided over by the Director, W. Calvin Chesnut.

Each student enrolled as a member of the Senior Class is required to satisfactorily prepare and argue at least one case in the Moot Court during the academic session.

Timely notice of the assignments of the students for the arguments will be posted on the bulletin board of the Law School. Four students will be assigned at each session, and will be furnished by the Director with copies of the pleadings or papers in the case selected for argument and a copy of the papers will also be posted on the bulletin board.

Whenever convenient other members of the Senior Class are invited to attend the sessions of the Court. At the conclusion of the formal argument by the students assigned, expressions of the views of others attending the argument will be invited by the Director. In this manner it is hoped that the work of the court will be rendered more interesting and instructive not only to those students formally assigned to argue the case, but also to the others attending. At the beginning of the session, one or more lectures will be delivered by the Director to the Senior Class on the method of examination of legal questions for oral arguments and preparation of briefs.

PRIZES AND HONORABLE MENTION.

The Faculty will at the close of the Session of 1906-1907 award two prizes:—

1. A prize of \$100 to that member of the graduating class attaining the highest grade in all the examinations.

At the close of the Session 1905-1906 this prize was awarded to Algernon Taylor Smith, of Midland, Md., and James Morfit Mullen, of Baltimore, Md., each receiving \$100, their grades being equal.

2. A prize of \$100 to that member of the graduating class who submits the best *thesis*.

At the close of the Session 1905-1906 this prize was awarded to Frederick Campbell Colston, of Baltimore, Md., by a committee consisting of Messrs. James M. Ambler, John Hinkley and James Piper, of the Baltimore Bar, for a thesis upon "Contracts Between Corporations Having Common Directors." The theses of George Winship Taylor, Algernon Taylor Smith and Walter Weddigen Derr received Honorable Mention.

All members of the graduating class who have attained an average grade of 95 in the six examinations will also be honorably mentioned in the order of their standing at the Commencement.

In the classes graduating after 1907, those five students in the graduating class who have obtained the highest grade for scholarship in all examinations will be honorably mentioned, and a grade prize of \$100 awarded to that one among the five who has attained the highest grade.

CALENDAR FOR SESSION 1906-1907.

Session and Terms.

The next session will commence on September 24, 1906, and will close June 3, 1907, There will be a short vacation from December 24, 1906, to January 1, 1907, inclusive. Lectures will be suspended on legal holidays and on Easter Monday.

The session is divided into two terms: The first term extends from the beginning of the session to February 2, 1907, and the second term from February 4, 1907, to June 3, 1907.

COMMENCEMENT.

The Commencement will be held June 3, 1907, at 8 P. M.

OPPORTUNITIES FOR ATTENDING OTHER LECTURES.

All the courses upon History and Politics at The Johns Hopkins University are open to law students upon the payment of very moderate fees, and are given at hours which do not interfere with the attendance upon the lectures at the Law School.

PRIVILEGES, COURTS, ETC.

Any student entered in one or two classes has the privilege, if he sees fit, to be present at the lectures in the other class or classes; and any graduate of the school has the privilege of attending all the lectures for the session next ensuing his graduation.

There are nine courts in almost continuous session in Baltimore during the entire scholastic year; the students have unusual opportunities to learn the law by attendance on the courts. Students are advised to attend the courts when they can conveniently do so, and to give careful attention and thought to the proceedings.

There is a Literary Society attached to the School, known as the Maryland University Debating Society, which is organized and conducted entirely by the students.

It has been the practice heretofore for students to form Quiz Clubs, composed of from five to ten members. They can, if properly conducted, be made very improving, and students are advised to form them.

COMMENCEMENT.

The Annual Commencement for the Session of 1905-1906 took place jointly with the Commencements of the Schools of Medicine and Pharmacy of the University of Maryland, in the Academy of Music, at 8 P. M., June 4th, 1906. Francis K. Carey, Esq., of the Baltimore Bar, delivered the annual adddress. Bernard Carter, Esq., Provost of the University, addressed the graduates in conferring the degrees, and awarded the prizes.

FEES AND EXPENSES.

The fees for each term are payable *strictly in advance* at the commencement of each term, and tickets of admission to the lectures are issued only on payment of fees.

The charges for instruction are as follows:

Students attending and taking the examinations of one class,

For Term of four months.......\$35 For Session of eight months...... 70

Students attending and taking the examinations of two classes during the same term,

For Term of four months......\$50 For Session of eight months.....100

Students attending and taking the examinations of any part of the course of a class will be charged the same rates as for the entire course.

There will be a Library Fee of *four dollars* per annum for each student, and an additional charge of *ten dollars* to each graduate as a Diploma Fee.

Special arrangements may be made by members of the bar, or others, not regular students of the Law School, for attending any particular part or branch of instruction at rates of charge in proportion to the above.

Board can be had in the city at prices varying from \$4 to \$10 per week.
