Agency, Partnership, Carriers and Shipping.

ALBERT C. RITCHIE.

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(A. B., J. H. U., 1896; LL. B., University of Maryland, 1898.)

Mr. RITCHIE will lecture to the INTERMEDIATE CLASS on Agency, Partnership, Carriers and Shipping. Text Books: Mechem's Outlines of the Law of Agency (Second Edition, Callaghan & Company, Chicago, 1903); Mechem's Elements of the Law of Partnership (Callaghan & Company, Chicago, 1899). Reference Books: Mechem's Elements of Partnership; Mechem on Agency; Hutchinson and Fetter on Carriers.

Method of Instruction.

Instruction will be given by *lectures, reading and catechising.* The *lectures* are intended to present all the leading principles of the common law applicable to the subject, and the modification of the common law by statute; and to give illustrations of the applications of the common and statute law. Special attention is given to the statutes in force in Maryland, and to peculiarities of the law in that State, where there are such; but the reasons for these statutory modifications and local peculiarities are explained so that the student may in a short time acquaint himself with the local peculiarities of the law in any State in which he may practice.

Readings from text books will be assigned on the subjects treated of in the lectures.

The *catechising* at each lecture will be on the subject discussed in the preceding lecture and on the assigned readings.

Library and Buildings.

The buildings of the several departments of the University of Maryland are all situated upon the corner of Lombard and Greene Streets. During the summer of 1907 the law building was enlarged and an additional lecture room provided. Connected with the lecture hall is a large and pleasant reading room and study, for the use of students, containing a carefully selected library of text books upon the subjects embraced in the course of study, volumes of Leading Cases, the English Common Law, United States and Maryland Reports, Digests, Statutes, etc., as well as many of the modern and best works on American and English History and Politics. The tables are supplied with the prominent Law Reviews, and the library is annually growing in size and value by the addition of new volumes.

Classes and Duration of Course.

The students attending the School are divided into three classes— A SENIOR CLASS, AN INTERMEDIATE CLASS and A JUNIOR CLASS. The subjects of study in each class are:

JUNIOR CLASS.

FIRST TERM—Common Law (Elementary Law), General Jurisprudence, Insurance, Criminal Law, and Domestic Relations.

SECOND TERM—Real Property, Personal Property, Bailments, Contracts, Quasi-Contracts, Sales and Suretyship.

INTERMEDIATE CLASS.

FIRST TERM—Agency, Partnership, Carriers, Shipping, Executors and Administrators, and Pleading and Torts.

SECOND TERM—Real Property (Title and Conveyancing), Corporations, Railroads, Bills and Notes, and Practice.

SENIOR CLASS.

FIRST TERM—Evidence, Damages, International Law, Public and Private, and Conflict of Laws.

SECOND TERM—Equity Jurisprudence and Procedure, Constitutional Law and Interpretation, Jurisdiction and Procedure of the Federal Courts, Admiralty and Bankruptcy.

THE LECTURES ARE ALL AFTER 4 P. M. A schedule of the arrangement of Lectures will be furnished at the beginning of the session. It will be seen that the FULL COURSE OF STUDY EXTENDS OVER THREE YEARS, and the Faculty are satisfied that students who have not made considerable progress in the study of law do themselves and the LAW SCHOOL an injury by attempting to graduate in a shorter period. Where students can afford it, they should spend three years in the study of law. But in order to meet the case of those who cannot afford this, students are permitted to enter and take the examinations of more than one class during the same term, their fitness to complete the course in less than three years being determined by their ability to pass the regular examinations at the close of each term and to comply with the other requirements for graduation. No STUDENT WILL, HOWEVER, BE PERMITTED TO COMPLETE THE COURSE IN LESS THAN TWO YEARS.

Registration.

All students are required when entering for EACH SESSION to report at the office in person and sign the register and procure tickets of admission to the lectures. The date of signing for each session will be noted, and names not upon the register will not be placed upon the class rolls. The stipulated period of attendance upon the LAW SCHOOL for the purpose of graduation, and for insertion in the certificate required to take the examination for admission to the bar before the Board of State Law Examiners, will be calculated from the register, and the class rolls made therefrom.

Examinations, Theses and Degrees.

The LAW SCHOOL confers the degree of Bachelor of Laws on students who have attended the course of lectures to all three classes, have attained the required standard at the examinations, have submitted to the FACULTY a satisfactory thesis, and argued the required number of cases in the Moot Court.

There are six examinations each session—two of the Senior Class, two of the Intermediate Class, and two of the Junior Class. Each class has an examination at the close of each term. The examinations are oral, or by printed questions to be answered in writing. Each examination is valued at 100. The subjects of study will be classified into major and minor subjects, as follows:

(a) MAJOR SUBJECTS: Domestic Relations; Personal Property and Contracts; Sales, Suretyship and Quasi-Contracts; Real Property; Pleading and Torts; Title and Conveyancing; Testamentary Law; Commercial Law and Shipping; Corporations; Evidence and Damages; Constitutional Law, and Equity.

(b) MINOR SUBJECTS: Elementary Law; General Jurisprudence; Criminal Law; Insurance; Bills and Notes; Practice; International Law, and Federal Procedure.

To be graduated and receive the degree of LL. B., a student must have obtained the passing grade of 75 per cent. on each distinct subject; but a student who has failed only upon one minor subject may be graduated, provided he has attained an average of 80 per cent. or above on all major subjects. In marking all examination papers, composition and clearness of expression will be taken into account.

The subjects for the theses for the next session will be given to the students in November, 1909, and they will be expected to hand them in to the FACULTY by April 1, 1910. The attention of the students is called to the fact that the Faculty will require a high standard of excellence in the theses.

The FACULTY reserve to themselves the right to refuse a degree to any student writing an unsatisfactory thesis or neglecting the preparation and argument of the Moot Court cases, whatever grade he may have attained at the examinations.

Preliminary Education.

In addition to the above-mentioned requirements, the FACULTY will require of candidates for the degree of LL. B. the completion of a High School course of study or its equivalent. The equivalent may be determined by the FACULTY upon certificates issued under public authority or by the authorities of an institution of advanced learning. The FACULTY will consider that students who have received the degree of A. B. from any reputable college or university, or certificate of graduation from any of the Normal or High Schools of the State of Maryland, or other reputable institution of a similar charactor, to be properly qualified. In the absence of such degrees or certificates, candidates for the degree of LL. B. must satisfactorily pass an examination in the ordinary studies required for graduation from the High Schools of this State, and particularly upon the following subjects:

1. ENGLISH—Spelling, Grammar, Composition and Literature.

2. HISTORY—United States and English.

3. MATHEMATICS—Arithmetic.

4. SCIENCE—Political Economy, and Physics or Geography.

5. LANGUAGES-Latin or French (at least two years' work).

The FACULTY strongly recommends that students not qualified without this examination should take it before entering upon the study at the LAW SCHOOL, but the privilege is given to candidates for degrees to take the examination in any September before graduation. The FACULTY will hold one such examination each year, in the latter part of September, to be announced in the catalogue. The examination will be held September 20th and 21st of this year, from 8 to 10 P. M.

On September 20th examinations will be held upon the following subjects:

(a) ENGLISH-Spelling, Grammar, Composition and Literature.

(b) HISTORY—United States and English.

On September 21st.

(a) MATHEMATICS—Arithmetic.

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(b) SCIENCE-Political Economy, and Physics or Geography.

(c) LANGUAGES-Latin or French (at least two years' work).

Moot Court.

The MOOT COURT will meet once a week during the session—generally on Friday evenings at 8 o'clock—and will be presided over by the Director, appointed by the FACULTY. Each student enrolled as a member of the Senior Class is required to satisfactorily prepare and argue at least one case in the Moor COURT during the academic session.

Timely notice of the assignments of the students for the arguments will be posted on the bulletin board of the LAW SCHOOL. Four students will be assigned at each session, and will be furnished by the Director with copies of the pleadings or papers in the case selected for argument and a copy of the papers will also be posted on the bulletin board.

Whenever convenient other members of the Senior Class are invited to attend the sessions of the Court. At the conclusion of the formal argument by the students assigned, expressions of the views of others attending the argument will be invited by the Director. In this manner it is hoped that the work of the court will be rendered more interesting and instructive not only to those students formally assigned to argue the case, but also to the others attending. At the beginning of the session, one or more lectures will be delivered by the Director to the Senior Class on the method of examination of legal questions for oral arguments and preparation of briefs.

Prizes and Honorable Mention.

The FACULTY will at the close of the session of 1909-10 award TWO PRIZES :----

1. A prize of \$100 to that member of the graduating class attaining the highest grade in all the examinations.

At the close of the session of 1908-1909 this prize was awarded to KARL SINGEWALD, of Baltimore, Md.

2. A prize of \$100 to that member of the graduating class who submits the best *thesis*.

At the close of the session of 1908-1909, this prize was awarded to Karl Singewald, of Baltimore, Md., by a committee of the Baltimore Bar consisting of Hon. William S. Bryan, Jr., and Messrs. Sylvan H. Lauchheimer and Charles McHenry Howard, for a thesis upon, "Liability for Damage to Real Property caused by building or excavating on adjoining property, with particular, but not exclusive reference to the construction of the Sewerage System in Baltimore City."

All members of the graduating class who have attained an average grade of 95 in the six examinations will also be honorably mentioned in the order of their standing at the Commencement.

Calendar for Session 1909-1910.

SESSION AND TERMS.

The FORTIETH ANNUAL SESSION will commence on September 20, 1909, and will close May 30, 1910. There will be a short vacation · from December 23, 1909, to January 2, 1910, inclusive. Lectures will be suspended on legal holidays and on Easter Monday.

The session is divided into two terms: The first term extends from the beginning of the session to January 30, 1910, and the second term from January 31, 1910, to May 30, 1910.

Commencement.

The Commencement will be held May 30, 1910, at 4 P. M.

Opportunities for Attending Other Lectures.

All the courses upon History and Politics at The Johns Hopkins University are open to law students upon the payment of very moderate fees, and are given at hours which do not interfere with the attendance upon the lectures at the LAW SCHOOL.

Privileges, Courts, Etc.

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Any student entered in one or two classes has the privilege, if he sees fit, to be present at the lectures in the other class or classes; and any graduate of the school has the privilege of attending all the lectures for the session next ensuing his graduation. There are nine Courts in almost continuous session in Baltimore during the entire scholastic year; the students have unusual opportunities to learn the law by attendance on the Courts. Students are advised to attend the Courts when they can conveniently do so, and to give careful attention and thought to the proceedings.

There is a Literary Society attached to the School, known as the Maryland University Debating Society, which is organized and conducted entirely by the students.

It has been the practice heretofore for students to form $Quiz\ Clubs$, composed of from five to ten members. They can, if properly conducted, be made very improving, and students are advised to form them.

Commencement.

The Annual Commencement for the session of 1908-1909 was held at the Academy of Music at 4 P. M., May 31, 1909, jointly with the other departments of the University. JOHN A. WYETH, M. D., LL. D., of New York City, delivered the annual address, and BERN-ARD CARTER, Esq., Provost of the University, conferred the degrees and awarded the prizes.

Fees and Expenses.

The fees for each term are payable *strictly in advance* at the commencement of each term, and tickets of admission to the lectures are issued only on payment of fees.

The charges for instruction are as follows:

Students attending and taking the examinations of one class:

For Term of four months.....\$37.50

For Session of eight months....\$75.00

Students attending and taking the examinations of two classes: during the same term:

For Term of four months..... \$60.00

For Session of eight months...\$120.00

Students attending and taking the examinations of any part of the course of a class will be charged the same rates as for the entire course.

There will be a Library Fee of *five dollars per annum* for each student, and an additional charge of *ten dollars* to each graduate as a Diploma Fee.

Special arrangements may be made by members of the Bar, or others, not regular students of the Law School, for attending any particular part or branch of instruction at rates of charge in proportion to the above.

Board can be had in the city at prices varying from \$4 to \$10 per week.

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The University of Maryland is represented by five departments, each having a distinct Faculty of Instruction.

1st. The SCHOOL OF MEDICINE, in Baltimore, Md. This School was established in Baltimore in 1807, and offers a high-grade course in medicine, extending over a period of four years, and leading to the degree of *Doctor of Medicine*. It represents the *Department of Medicine*.

2nd. THE SCHOOL OF LAW, in Baltimore, Md. This School, founded in 1812, and reorganized in 1869, is designed, by means of a course of study covering three years, to qualify its students for the degree of *Bachelor of Laws*, and for an intelligent practice of the law. It represents the *Department of Law*.

3rd. THE DEPARTMENT OF DENTISTRY was organized in 1882, and is designed to teach the art of dentistry as an integral part of the SCHOOL OF MEDICINE. The course of study leading to the degree of *Doctor of Dental Surgery* covers a period of three years.

4th. THE DEPARTMENT OF PHARMACY was established in 1840 as the Maryland College of Pharmacy, and affiliated with the SCHOOL OF MEDICINE in 1904. The course of study, including thorough training in the art of dispensing and methods of proper selection of drugs, covers two years, and leads to the degree of *Doctor of Pharmacy*.

5th. THE COLLEGE OF LIBERAL ARTS, at Annapolis, Md. ST. JOHN'S COLLEGE, Annapolis, founded in 1696 as King William's School, has by affiliation become the *Department of Arts and Sciences* of the UNIVESITY OF MARYLAND. The curriculum leads to the degree of *Bachelor*, or *Master*, of *Arts and Sciences*.

(a) Seniors in St. John's College may elect twelve requisite hours a week in the Law School of the University. The degree of *Bachelor of Arts* or *Bachelor of Science* is conferred upon such students at the end of the year. The *Professional Degree* may be reached in two years more.

(b) Students who have completed the Junior Year in St. John's College and who have made an approved choice of electives may, if they desire, do the entire work of the Senior Year in the Medical School of the University. If they successfully complete the work of the first medical year, they are graduated with their class with the degree of A. B. from St. John's College.

By taking advantage of this privilege, a man may complete the Undergraduate and Medical courses in seven years.

During three of these years, or until he has completed the work of the Junior Class, he is a resident student in St. John's College, and for four years he is a resident in the Medical School in Baltimore.

At the end of the fourth year, he receives the A. B. degree, and at the end of the seven years the M. D. degree, but credit from the Medical School cannot be accepted in subjects for which credit has already been given in the College of Liberal Arts.
