

#### RESOLUTIONS OF THE BOARD OF DI-RECTORS OF THE LIBRARY COM-PANY OF THE BALTIMORE BAR.

The following resolutions were passed by the Directors of the Bar Library on Thursday last: (May 7, 1903.)

I. Resolved, That on and after the first day of October, 1903, members of the Bar practising and residing outside of the city of Baltimore, and within the distance of thirty miles from the boundary line thereof, and not having a law office in Baltimore city, shall be allowed to use the books in the Library rooms, or in the several courts of Baltimore city, upon payment of the annual sum of ten dollars for said privilege, payable on the first Monday of October in each year in advance to the Librarian.

II. That members of the legal profession residing elsewhere than in the city of Baltimore, and not within said thirty miles limit therefrom, shall be allowed by courtesy the use of the Library, while temporarily in the city of Baltimore, upon being introduced by any member, and entering their names and places of residence in a book to be kept for that purpose.

<sup>1</sup>III. And resolved further, that all rules and parts of rules, heretofore adopted, inconsistent with the foregoing, are hereby repealed.

Resolved, That from and after the first day of June, 1903, no law student shall be admitted to the Library except between the hours of ten A. M. and one P. M.; and that between said hours, students shall only be admitted on a written certificate from the Dean of one of the three law schools in the City of Baltimore, that the said student named in the certificate is at that time engaged either in the preparation of a moot court case, or in the preparation of a thesis, required for graduation in the said law school. There are three law schools in Baltimore at present-the Law Department of the University of Maryland, corner of Greene and Lombard streets: the Baltimore Law School, Madison, near Howard street, and the Baltimore University School of Law, Charles, below Saratoga street. The courses at these schools are three years, but some students who have plenty of time for study during the day and who learn rapidly have made the course in two years. Catalogues will be furnished you upon application to the secretaries. Classes at all these schools are held in the afternoons and evenings.





We shall go on with our labors saddened by the deep sense of our irreparable loss, but ever cherishing the tenderest recollection of the beauty and purity of his life, the fidelity and force which were so conspicuous in his work and the unbroken har mony of our long and affectionate association.

#### EXECUTORS AND ADMINISTRATORS.

1. Within what length of time may creditors prove their claims against the estate of a deceased? And within what period of time should suit be brought by a creditor? (3)

2. What is ancillary administration, and under what conditions is such administration to be applied for and granted? (2)

3. A caveat was filed to the will of H. after the same had been admitted to probate and letters testamentary issued. The caveators then filed a petition to rescind the letters testamentary and for the grant of letters *pendente lite*. Should the petition have been granted or refused? (3)

#### In Memoriam.

At a meeting of the Faculty of Law of the University of Maryland, held this day, the following Memorial Minute was adopted:

We record with inexpressible sorrow the sudden and pathetic death of our late colleague, ROBERT M. McLANE, whose untimely end has cast a universal gloom over the community and deprived us of the cherished companionship and highly valued aid of a beloved associate, of whose work at the University we had justly formed the highest anticipations.







Both of said affidavits must be to the effect that during the entire period of such clerkship. except during the stated vacation time, the applicant was actually employed by the said attorney as a regular law clerk and student in his law office, and under his direction and advice, engaged in the practical work of the office during the usual business hours of the day.

Fourth: The time of study allowed in a law school must be proved by the certificate of the teacher or President of the faculty, under whose instructions the person has studied, under the seal of the school, if such there be, in addition to the affidavit of the applicant, which must, also, state the age at which the applicant began his attendance at such law school. Said certificate and affidavit must, also, show that the law school prescribes the course of instruction contemplated by these rules, and each shall also contain the statement that said applicant took and prescribed course of instruction required by said school for the degree of Bachelor of Laws while in attendance thereat and bona fide took and successfully passed all examinations in all the subjects required for said degree during such period of attendance, in each case specifying the subjects in which said applicant took and passed his ex aminations as aforesaid, which proof must be satisfactory to the Board of Examiners:

Fifth; That the applicant has passed the Regents' examination or its equivalent must be proved by the production of a certified copy of the Regents' certificate filed in the office of the Clerk of the Court of Appeals, as hereinafter provided.

Sight: When it satisfactorily appears that any diploma, affidavit, or certificate, required to be produced has been lost, or destroyed, without the fault of the applicant, or has been unjustly refused or withheld, or by the death or absence of the person or officer who should have made it, can not be obtained, the Board of Law Examiners may accept such other proof requisite facts as they shall deem sufficient. Seventh. A law student whose clerkship, or attendance at a law school has already begun, as shown by the records of the Court of Appeals, or of any incorporated law school, or law school established in connection with any college or university, may, at his option, file or produce, instead of the proof required by these rules, those required by the Rules of the Court of Appeals in force June 1st.1908.

### LAW SCHOOL TO OPEN

### Hon. C. J. Bonaparte Now Mem-

#### ber of Faculty.

The Law School of the University of Maryland will reopen on Monday next at 4 P. M. The preliminary entrance examinations will be held on Monday and Tuesday evenings next, beginning at 8 o'clock. From the number of applicants for catalogues and inquiries received at the registrar's office the attendance of students will be large.

There are several changes in the faculty and courses of construction on account of the death of the late John P. Poe and the resignation of Professor William T. Brantly. Mr. Charles J. Bonaparte, one of the most distinguished members of the bar and attorney general of the United States in the Roosevelt administration, has become a member of the faculty and will lecture on the law of contracts in place of Mr. Brantly. Mr. William L. Marbury, a former graduate of the Law School and a member of the well-known firm of Marbury & Gosnell, will take a part of Mr. Poe's course and lecture on the law of torts. The rest of Mr. Poe's courses have been distributed among the other mem-

The rest of Mr. Poe's courses have been distributed among the other members of the faculty. Mr. Joseph C. France surrenders to Mr. Albert C. Ritchie his course on elementary law, and continuing to lecture on corporations, in which field he is such a recognized authority, will also teach the law of pleading and practice, for which his constant appearance in the courts eminently fits him. Judge Gorter, of the Supreme Bench, has accepted the chair of evidence in addition to the one he has heretofore held/ on equity jurisprudence and procedure.

on equity jurisprudence and procedure. The faculty has also determined to give to its students, in addition to its regular course by resident locturers, special lectures from time to the by nonresident lecturers upon topics dealing with the history, development or science of the law or special branches thereof. They have secured as the first lecturer in this special course that eminent jurist, statesman, educator and legal author. Simeon E. Baldwin, lately chief justice of the Supreme Court of Errors of Connecticut, for sometime professor of Constitutional Law and Private International Law in Yale, who will, on December 19 and 20, deliver two lectures on "International Private Law in the Twentieth Century." These lectures will be open to members of the bar, and others who are interested. Judge Baldwin, since he accepted the invitation to inaugurate this new course of lectures, enjoys the distinction of having been nominated by one of the leading political parties as Governor of Connecticut.

#### A FINE OLD SCHOOL

The University of Maryland School of Law continues to "measure up." When Major Venable and Mr. Poe died it was felt that the institution had suffered a serious loss and some faint-hearts expressed the fear that it would be difficult to replace them. But the selection of men like Mr. Bonaparte and Mr. Marbury shows that the standards are going to be maintained and that the school will suffer no loss of prestige or efficiency.

It is a pathetic thing to think of, from one standpoint—this fact that no man is indispensable. It is an inspiring thing from another standpoint. This Maryland University School of Law is a fine old institution and Maryland is proud of it. May she grow from more to more!
