The School of Law

Introductory Statement

THE LAW SCHOOL OF THE UNIVERSITY OF MARYLAND is rated as an "Approved School" by the American Bar Association. It is also a member of the Association of American Law Schools, an organization whose purpose is the advancement of legal education, membership in which is dependent upon meeting and maintaining certain standards as to entrance requirements, faculty, library and curriculum.

It is the only school in Maryland which has been so recognized and which offers what is regarded by the bodies named as proper preparation for the practice of law or whose standards of admission and instruction are those recommended by them. In most jurisdictions graduates of schools not substantially complying with those standards are not eligible to take the bar examinations; and in many jurisdictions, recognition is refused to law study in a school not fully approved by the American Bar Association.

The American Bar Association standards are set forth in the following resolutions:

- "(1) The American Bar Association is of the opinion that every candidate for the admission to the Bar should give evidence of graduation from a law school complying with the following standards:
 - (a) It shall require as a condition of admission at least three years of study in a college.
 - (b) It shall require its students to pursue a course of three years' duration if they devote substantially all of their working time to their studies, and a longer course, equivalent to the number of working hours, if they devote only part of their working time to their studies.

- (c) It shall provide an adequate library available for the use of the students.
- (d) It shall have among its teachers a sufficient number giving their entire time to the school to insure actual personal acquaintance with the whole student body.
- (e) It shall not be operated as a commercial enterprise and the compensation of any officer or member of its teaching staff shall not depend on the number of students or on the fees received.
- (f) It shall be a school which in the judgment of the Council on Legal Education and Admissions to the Bar possesses reasonably adequate facilities and maintains a sound educational policy; provided, however, that any decision of the Council in these respects shall be subject to review by the House of Delegates on the petition of any school adversely affected.
- "(2) The American Bar Association is of the opinion that graduation from a law school should not confer the right of admission to the Bar, and that every candidate should be subjected to an examination by public authority to determine his fitness.
- "(3) The Council on Legal Education and Admission to the Bar is directed to publish from time to time the names of those law schools which comply with the above standards and those which do not, and to make such publications available so far as possible to intending law students."

The standards of the Association of American Law Schools are substantially the same, being somewhat more exacting in some instances.

HISTORICAL SKETCH

The General Assembly of Maryland in 1812 authorized the College of Medicine of Maryland, founded in 1807, "to constitute, appoint and annex to itself three other colleges or faculties, viz., the Faculty of Divinity, the Faculty of Law, and the Faculty of Arts and Sciences," and declared that "the four colleges or faculties thus united should be constituted an University by the name and under the title of the University of Maryland." In pursuance of this authority the University was organized in 1813, and is thus one of the oldest chartered universities in America.

The first faculty of law was chosen in 1813, when David Hoffman was elected Professor of law. He published in 1817 "A Course of Legal Study Addressed to Students and the Profession Generally," which Justice Story in an article in the North American Review pronounced to be "by far the most perfect system for the study of law which has ever been offered to the

public," and which recommended a course of study so comprehensive as to require for its completion six or seven years. Regular instruction in law was begun in 1823, but was suspended in 1836 for lack of proper pecuniary support. Hoffman's ideals of legal education were far in advance of his times and in consequence there were but few students able or willing to spend the time required by his course. In 1869 the Law School was reorganized, and in 1870 regular instruction therein was resumed. Its graduates now number more than thirty-five hundred, and include a large proportion of the past and present leaders of the bench and bar in the State, as well as many who have attained prominence in the profession elsewhere.

Two other schools, the Baltimore Law School and the Baltimore University of Law, were organized under charters granted by the State of Maryland. These two schools were subsequently consolidated under the name of the Baltimore Law School in 1911 and in 1913 the Baltimore Law School was in turn merged into the Law School of the University of Maryland. On July 1, 1920, the University of Maryland at Baltimore and the Maryland State College at College Park were consolidated under the name of the University of Maryland.

The building of the Schools of Law, Medicine, Dentistry and Pharmacy of the University of Maryland are located in the vicinity of Lombard and Greene Streets, in the City of Baltimore, the Law School building being at the southeast corner of Redwood and Greene Streets. This building was erected in 1931 and is a three-story building of colonial design, devoted exclusively to law-school purposes. The first floor contains an auditorium and practice court, students' lounge, the administrative offices and the women's locker room; on the second floor are four class-rooms; on the third floor are two reading-rooms and offices for the law faculty; in the basement is the men's locker room. The west wing of the building is devoted to stack space and to quarters for the Law Review. A new building for the Law School, to occupy the block bounded by Paca and Baltimore Streets, should be completed in the academic year 1964-65.

The Law Library now contains some 45,000 volumes. Included therein are several complete sets of the Maryland and Baltimore City reports; all the editions, official and unofficial, of the Supreme Court reports and inferior Federal courts; the National Reporter System and the reports of the Courts of last resort of all states prior thereto, as well as the published decisions of the more important inferior state courts; the English Law Reports since 1865 and the English Reprint and English Common Law and Chancery Reports covering the period prior to that time; the Dominion Reports; the various selected case series of annotated reports; the statute law of the United States, the several states, and Great Britain, as well as multiple sets of all Maryland codes and session laws; the American Digest

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System, the English and Empire Digest, and multiple sets of all Maryland Digests; a large collection of textbooks and treatises; all of the leading legal periodicals, encyclopedias, citators and other search books. The library is open on weekdays for the use of the students from 9:00 A.M. to 10:30 P.M., and on Saturdays from 9:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M.

ARRANGEMENT OF HOURS

The Law School is divided into two divisions, the Day School and the Evening School. Substantially the same curriculum is offered in each school, and the standards of work and graduation requirements are the same.

The normal Day School course covers a period of three years of thirty-two weeks each, exclusive of holidays.

The normal Evening School course covers a period of four years of thirty-six weeks each, exclusive of holidays. The class sessions are held on Monday, Wednesday and Friday evenings of each week from 6:30 to 10:00 o'clock, leaving the alternate evenings for study and preparation by the student.

REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION

Applicants for admission are required to produce evidence of the successful completion of at least three-quarters of the work acceptable for a bachelor's degree granted on the basis of a four-year period of study at an accredited college or university; to satisfy this requirement, applicants must normally have successfully completed at least 90 semester hours or 135 quarter hours of undergraduate work exclusive of credit earned in nontheory courses in military science, hygiene, domestic arts, physical education, vocal or instrumental music, or other courses without intellectual content of substantial value. An applicant must have attained an overall scholastic average on all undergraduate work taken by him at least equal to that required for graduation in the institution attended. Admission of applicants with only three years of college work is limited to students whose college records and law school admission test scores are sufficiently high to justify acceleration of their programs of formal academic and professional education. In most cases it is advisable to complete the program for a bachelor's degree before beginning the study of law.

All applicants are required to take the Law School Admission Test administered by the Educational Testing Service. This is a legal aptitude test given at many points within and outside the United States in November, February, April, and August in each year. It is recommended that the test be taken in November or February prior to the September in which admission is planned as it is sometimes advisable to take the test a second

time; it is not necessary that formal application for admission to the School of Law be made before taking the test. Applicants should write the Educational Testing Service, 20 Nassau Street, Princeton, N.J., for application forms and information as to the test, and should indicate on the application form that their scores should be reported to the University of Maryland School of Law. Results will also be sent to such other law schools as the applicant may designate as well as to the applicant himself. Completed test applications must reach the Educational Testing Service at least two weeks before the test date.

The chief criteria considered by the School in deciding upon admissions are the college scholastic average (grades in nontheory courses of the type described above are not included in determining such scholastic average) and the results of the Law School Admission Test, as experience indicates that these criteria are the best available predictors of success in law study. The right is reserved to refuse admission to applicants with sufficient scholastic credit, whose presence in the School would be detrimental to the best interests of the School.

Applicants are urged to file their applications as early as possible in the academic year preceding admission, but not before October 1 of such year. Applications for the Day School must be filed by July 15 and applications for the Evening School must be filed by August 15 to be considered for admission in September, unless special circumstances are shown to exist warranting a late filing. An early application for admission is desirable in view of the possibility that classes will be filled before the above dates. An applicant must make the necessary arrangements with the registrar of his college (or colleges) to have an official transcript of his record mailed promptly to the Director of Admissions, University of Maryland, Building 520-R, Room 201, Lombard and Greene Streets, Baltimore 1, Maryland,

ADMISSION TO ADVANCED STANDING—Students complying with the requirements for admission to the school who have, in addition, successfully pursued the study of law elsewhere in a law school which, at the time of such student's attendance, was either a member of the Association of American Law Schools or approved by the American Bar Association may, in the discretion of the Faculty Council, upon presentation of a certificate from such accredited law school showing honorable dismissal therefrom, and the successful completion of equivalent courses therein, receive credit for such courses completed with grades of at least C or the equivalent and be admitted to advanced standing. No student transferring from another law school will be admitted who is not in good scholastic standing at the school from which he transfers. No degree will be conferred until after at least one year of residence and study at this school.

PRELEGAL STUDY—The School does not prescribe any particular undergraduate courses for admission. Proper preparation for the study of law is generally thought to depend not so much upon the specific courses taken by the prelegal student as upon the development of capacity to read and comprehend rapidly and accurately, to think precisely, to analyze complex fact situations, and to speak and write clearly and intelligently. Ordinarily a prelegal student would do well to follow a Bachelor of Arts or Science program with emphasis on courses in English, American and English History, Economics, Political Science and Government, and Sociology. However, students differ widely in their interests, and are consequently advised to concentrate primarily on subjects which they find of particular intellectual interest and stimulation.

Students planning to take the Maryland bar examination on completion of their law studies are required by the rules as to prelegal study of the Court of Appeals to include in their prelegal course at least eight semester hours of English and eight semester hours of history, economics or political science.

TIMES OF ADMISSION—Beginning students are admitted only once a year, at the opening of the fall semester in September. Applicants for admission to advanced standing may be admitted at the beginning of any semester.

COMBINED PROGRAM OF STUDIES LEADING TO THE DEGREES OF BACHELOR OF ARTS OR BACHELOR OF SCIENCE AND BACHELOR OF LAWS

The University of Maryland offers combined programs in arts or business administration and law leading to the degrees of bachelor of arts or bachelor of science and bachelor of laws.

Students pursuing such combined programs will spend the first three years in either the College of Arts and Sciences or in the College of Business and Public Administration at College Park. Then, if accepted by the School of Law, they will begin their law work in Baltimore. Upon the successful completion of the first year in the Day School or the equivalent work in the Evening School they will be recommended for the degree of bachelor of arts or bachelor of science as the case may be; a weighted average of at least C is required on law work submitted in satisfaction of the requirements for either of these degrees. The degree of bachelor of laws will be awarded upon the successful completion of the work prescribed for graduation in the School of Law.

Details of the combined courses are included in the catalogues of the College of Arts and Sciences and the College of Business and Public Administration; these may be obtained upon application to the Director of Publications, University of Maryland, College Park, Maryland.

REGISTRATION

All students are required to report in person at the office of the Secretary of the Law School and enroll. No registration will be allowed, except by special action of the Dean, after the last day for registration as designated in the calendar.

All students are expected to complete their registration including the filing of class cards and payment of bills on the regular registration days. Those who do not complete their registration during the prescribed days will be charged a fee of \$10.00.

VETERANS' EDUCATIONAL BENEFITS

The University is approved by the Veterans Administration for participation in the program of educational benefits provided for veterans under Public Laws 550 (the Veterans Readjustment Assistance Act of 1952) and 894 (the Vocational Rehabilitation Act.)

A veteran planning to enter law school under either of these laws should file his application with the Veterans Administration as early as possible, in order that this may be approved before the veteran begins his law studies.

The Student Union fee is payable by all students enrolled in the Professional Schools on the Baltimore Campus and is used to pay interest on and amortize the cost of construction of the Union Building. The Special fee is payable by all full-time students enrolled in the Professional Schools on the Baltimore campus and is used to finance the equipment needed for the Union Building. For students enrolling for the first time at the beginning of the spring semester, the Student Union fee will be \$15.00 in the day division and \$3.00 in the evening division; the Special Fee will be \$5.00. All day division students carrying as much as 10 credit hours of work are considered full-time students subject to this fee.

The tuition fee and student activities fee for each semester are payable at the time of registration therefor. The Student Union fee and the Special fee are payable in full at the time of first registration. Students wishing to make arrangements for deferred payment of tuition charges must do so with the Financial Office at or prior to registration for the semester for which such charges are imposed. Students carrying less than ten credit hours in the Day division or less than six credit hours in the Evening division will be charged on the basis of \$15.00 per semester hour carried; an additional fee of \$25.00 per semester will be charged such students in the Day division who are non-residents of Maryland.

HOUSING ACCOMMODATIONS

The Baltimore Union for students of the Professional Schools is located adjacent to the Professional Schools at 621 West Lombard Street. Accommodations for 195 men are provided in a five-story semi-air conditioned building which also contains a cafeteria, fountain lounge, meeting rooms, laundry facilities, game room, bookstore, barbershop and lounges on each floor. Double rooms are available. The rental agreement is made for rooms only; meals are served cafeteria style on a cash basis. The contract for accommodations covers the academic year. The charge for each student in a double room is \$150.00 per semester.

The room rate includes the following: Room furnishings, bed and cover, mattress, chest of drawers, closet, book shelves, desk, medicine cabinet, desk chair and desk lamp. Maid service will include cleaning of room twice per week and change of linen once each week. Telephone service is available through the Chesapeake & Potomac Telephone Company. Cost of the telephone is not included in the room rate. Information can be obtained from the Manager's Office. Mail service is also provided.

Towels and linens must be rented through the designated Commercial Rental Service. A small amount of luggage space is available. Storage of anything other than luggage will not be available.

Application forms may be secured from the Manager's Office, The Baltimore Union, 621 West Lombard Street, Baltimore 1, Maryland. Rooms will be assigned only on receipt of an application form duly executed and accompanied by the required deposit.

DEFINITION OF RESIDENCE AND NON-RESIDENCE

Students who are minors are considered to be resident students if at the time of their registration their parents have been domiciled in this State for at least six months.

The status of the residence of a student is determined at the time of his first registration in the University, and may not thereafter be changed by him unless, in the case of a minor, his parents move to and become legal residents of this State by maintaining such residence for at least six months. However, the right of the minor student to change from a non-resident to a resident status must be established by him prior to the registration period set for any semester.

Adult students are considered to be residents if at the time of their registration they have been domiciled in this State for at least six months provided such residence has not been acquired while attending any school or college in Maryland or elsewhere.

Time spent on active duty in the armed services while stationed in Maryland will not be considered as satisfying the six-month period referred to above except in those cases in which the student was domiciled in Maryland for at least six months prior to his entrance into the armed service and was not enrolled in any school during that period.

The word domicile as used in this regulation shall mean the permanent place of abode. For the purpose of this rule only one domicile may be maintained.

REBATES

The application fee, matriculation fee, late registration fee, student activities fee, the Student Union fee and the Special fee are not subject to rebate. The tuition fee will be rebated in case of withdrawal of a student during the course of a semester, in accordance with the following schedule:

In all cases of withdrawals from school, immediate notice in writing must be given to the Dean. The effective date for withdrawals, so far as concerns refunds of tuition, is the date that such notice is received in the Dean's Office.

SCHOLARSHIPS AND LOANS

ASHMAN SCHOLARSHIPS—Established in 1922 by Mr. Louis S. Ashman, an alumnus of the School of Law, who assigned to the Regents all royalites from the publication of his books on "Prayers and Instructions" and "Directed Prayers and Instructions" to provide a fund for the payment of a

scholarship or scholarships to a student or students recommended by the Faculty Council as worthy to receive the same by reason of scholarly attainments and the need of financial assistance. The value of each scholarship is about \$150.00. In accordance with the donor's wishes, preference will be given to former servicemen in making such awards.

ALUMNI ASSOCIATION SCHOLARSHIPS—Established in 1953 by the Alumni Association. A limited number of scholarships carrying tuition will be awarded each year.

WALTER L. CLARK SCHOLARSHIPS—Established in 1957 under the will of the late Walter L. Clark, an alumnus and former member of the Law School faculty. Approximately six scholarships of the value of \$300.00 each will be awarded each year.

CLASS OF 1951 SCHOLARSHIP—Established in 1959 by the class of 1951. At least one scholarship carrying tuition will be awarded annually.

LEE I. HECHT MEMORIAL FUND—A fund established in 1958 in memory of the late Lee I. Hecht of Baltimore by his sons Alan D. Hecht and Isaac Hecht. The fund is administered by the Central Scholarship Bureau, Inc., 5441 Park Heights Avenue, Baltimore 15.

LAWYERS' WIVES SCHOLARSHIP—Established in 1959 by the Lawyers' Wives. A scholarship in the amount of \$200.00 will be awarded annually to a worthy Negro student.

REAL ESTATE TITLE COMPANY SCHOLARSHIP—Established in 1959 by the Real Estate Title Company. A scholarship of \$300.00 will be awarded annually.

STEIN MEMORIAL FUND—A fund originally established for students in need of financial assistance by the late Judge Charles F. Stein of Baltimore and continued in his memory. Small loans of short duration to cover emergencies may be granted out of this fund. Applications should be made to the Dean, under whose control the fund is placed.

THOMAS FUNDS—Established in 1962 under the will of Zaidee T. Thomas, the income from the "William Strobel Thomas Scholarship Fund" and the "John L. Thomas Scholarship Fund" provides pecuniary aid to students at the Law School in the form of both scholarships and loans.

POLICIES AND PROCEDURES—Scholarship awards are based on both scholastic achievement and demonstrated financial need, with the weight given to each factor varying according to the funds available and the circumstances of each case. The amount of any scholarship stipend also depends on the above factors, the maximum stipend not exceeding \$300.00 for an academic year.

The Law School student loan program provides financial aid beyond scholarship awards where the need for additional funds above the scholarship has been demonstrated. Law School loans are available to law students currently enrolled in the school for which scholarship funds are not available, as long as their cumulative Law School average is 2.0 or above and need has been demonstrated. Law School loans are limited to a maximum of \$1,000.00 a year (or \$500.00 a semester). Such loans will be repayable in 20% annual installments over a five-year period, the first installment to be due at the end of the first year following graduation (or termination of law studies) with interest at 2% per annum beginning with the first month after graduation (or termination of law studies). Six per cent interest will be charged for any period during which repayment of principal is in arrears. Loan applicants are encouraged to apply for the entire year, with one half of the loan to be made available each semester. In general loans are granted on the basis of both demonstrated financial need and scholastic achievement

In addition to the above Law School loan program, students at Law School are eligible to apply for loans under the National Defense Education Act of 1958. Such loans are available up to \$800.00 for an academic year. Loans granted to students applying for both National Defense Education Act loans and Law School loans cannot exceed the maximum specified for Law School loans. The payment of a National Defense Education Act loan begins one year after the borrower ceases to be a full time student and must be completed within ten years thereafter. No interest is charged on the loan until the beginning of the repayment schedule. Interest after that date is to be paid at the rate of 3% per annum.

Application forms for Law School scholarships and loans (and for loans under the National Defense Education Act) may be obtained at the Dean's office, and should be filed there by May 1 preceding the academic year for which the scholarship or loan is to be awarded. Application for a loan for only the spring semester may be filed by December 1. Scholarships and loans are awarded for only one academic year and a new application should be filed to renew a scholarship or a loan for a succeeding year. Applications will be acted upon by the Faculty Committee on Scholarships and Loans after the close of the academic year and the applicants will be notified of the decision as quickly as possible.

REGISTRATION WITH THE COURT OF APPEALS AND ADMISSION TO THE BAR

Under the rules governing admission to the Bar in the State of Maryland, each applicant is required to register with the State Board of Law Examiners as a law student before beginning the study of law. Applicants for such registration must have completed, in addition to a high school education or the equivalent, two years of work in a college approved by the Board of Law Examiners, or the equivalent. Application blanks for such registration may be procured from the Secretary by the student at the time of his registration in the Law School. A fee of \$25.00, payable to the State Board of Law Examiners, must accompany each application for registration. Such registration as a law student with the State Board of Law Examiners does not automatically qualify an applicant for admission to the Law School, for which compliance with the requirements set forth on pages 9 and 10 is essential.

Admission to the Bar is upon examination by the State Board of Law Examiners. The examinations are held in July and March each year, and embrace the following subjects: Agency, Conflict of Laws, Constitutional Law, Contracts, Corporations, Criminal Law, Domestic Relations, Equity, Evidence, Negotiable Instruments, Personal Property, Pleading and Practice at Law and in Equity, Administrative Law Including Public Service Companies, Real Property, Torts, and Testamentary Law. All of the required courses are included in the curriculum offered by the Law School.

Applicants for admission to the Bar must have studied law in a law school recognized by the State Board of Law Examiners and must file a petition with the State Board of Law Examiners at least twenty days before the day fixed for the examination they wish to take. A fee of \$25.00, payable to the State Board of Law Examiners, must accompany each application for permission to take the bar examination.

Further information concerning the examination or matters relating to admission to the bar may be had upon application to Mr. Wilson K. Barnes, Secretary, State Board of Law Examiners, 900 Maryland Trust Building, Baltimore 2, Maryland.

EXAMINATIONS AND GRADES

Written examinations are held at the end of the course in all subjects except seminars, the Practice Court and the Legal Aid Clinic. Unless excused by the Dean, all students must present themselves for examination in each subject for which they are registered at the first regular examination held therein in order to receive credit for such course. A student may not drop a course for which he is registered after the third week of the semester in which the course is first offered, except by permission of the Dean. A course may be audited only with the permission of the instructor. Students dropping a course or changing from credit to audit must give immediate notice to the Dean's Office. Without special permission from the Dean, a student may not carry in the Day School less than 12 nor more than 16 hours per week and, in the Evening School, less than 6 nor more than 12 hours per week.

The right to take the examination in any course as well as the privilege of continuing as a student in the School is conditioned upon regular attendance. A student who has been absent from more than 25% of the lectures in a course will not be considered eligible to take the examination therein except by special permission of the Faculty Council upon petition filed by him. If his petition is denied or if no petition is filed, he shall receive no credit in the course and in the discretion of the Faculty Council may be assigned a grade of F or required to withdraw from the School, depending upon the circumstances of each case.

A student failing to present himself for examination in any course must report to the Dean as soon as the circumstances which caused the absence will permit; otherwise a grade of F will be entered.

The following grade symbols are used: A, signifying "excellent"; B, signifying "very good"; C, signifying "good"; D, signifying "passed"; F, signifying "failure"; I, signifying "incomplete." Of these, A, B, C, and D are passing grades, but a grade of D can be counted toward graduation only as hereinafter stated. For the purpose of computing the average grade of a student, the following values are assigned to the grades received: A equals 4; B equals 3; C equals 2; D equals 1; F equals 0.

The grade of I is given only to those students who have a proper excuse for failure to present themselves for examinations or to complete any other work that may be required by the instructor in any course. It is not used to signify work of inferior quality. It may be replaced later by a definite grade for the course, when the instructor therein is prepared to report it.

First year students with a weighted average at the end of the scholastic year below 1.4 and all other students with a weighted average at the end of the scholastic year below 1.5 will be permanently excluded from the School.

This rule is also applicable to any student who withdraws from School with a weighted average at the time of withdrawal below what would be required of him at the end of the scholastic year.

The Faculty Council reserves the right to require the withdrawal of any student whose continued presence would not, in the judgment of the Council, either because of low scholastic standing or other reasons, be of benefit to himself or would be detrimental to the best interests of the School. The Faculty Council also reserves the right to make such changes in the above regulations as may from time to time seem desirable.

REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION

To be eligible for the Bachelor of Laws degree, a student must have successfully completed courses totaling at least 80 semester hours, in at least three-fourths of which he must have received a grade of C or higher; provided, however, that a student who has undertaken at least 80 semester hours and who has failed in not more than one subject, may be allowed to graduate if his general weighted average, including such failure, is at least C.

In addition to accumulating sufficient credits, a student must comply with the following residence requirement: In the Day School, a student must have been in residence for six semesters, and in the Evening School a student must have been in residence for eight semesters. In the event of transfer from one School to the other, one semester's residence in the Evening School will be considered ¾ of a semester in the Day School, and one semester's residence in the Day School will be considered 4/3 of a semester in the Evening School. To illustrate the rule, 3 semesters in the Day School and 4 semesters in the Evening School will satisfy the residence requirement; while 2 semesters in the Day School and 5 semesters in the Evening School will not satisfy this requirement.

HONORS AND PRIZES

A student who complies with the requirements for graduation and who attains in all work done in courses offered in the School, and presented for the degree, an average grade of not less than 3., may be recommended by the Faculty Council for graduation with Honor.

Under the will of Mrs. W. Calvin Chesnut, the sum of \$1,000.00 was paid to the Regents of the University as an endowment, the annual income to be used for the purpose of giving a prize for good scholarship in a broad sense, to be determined by the Dean of the School of Law annually, to be known as the Elizabeth Maxwell Carroll Chesnut Prize.

Under the will of Judge W. Calvin Chesnut, the sum of \$5,000 was transferred to the Regents of the University in 1962 to provide annual prizes for outstanding excellence in scholarship. The "Judge W. Calvin Chesnut Prizes for Scholarship in Law," so established, are used to recognize outstanding scholastic achievement during the first year of Law School.

The William Strobel Thomas Prize Fund and the John L. Thomas Prize Fund, each providing an annual \$200 prize, were established in 1962 under the will of Zaidee T. Thomas, under the terms of which the two members of the Senior class who graduate with the highest averages for scholarship are each awarded a \$200 prize.

The G. Ridgely Sappington Prize, established in memory of G. Ridgely Sappington, for many years a member of the faculty of the School of Law, is awarded annually to the student doing the best work in the Day Division course in Practice, in which Mr. Sappington was the instructor at the time of his death.

The Edward H. Curlander Prizes are awarded annually to the students doing the best work in the courses in Testamentary Law and in Future Interests (Real Property III).

The Nu Beta Epsilon National Law Fraternity Prize was established in 1951 by the Alpha Chapter founded at the University of Maryland School of Law in 1918. Law books are awarded annually to the senior student who is adjudged by the faculty advisor of the Maryland Law Review to have submitted the most significant piece of legal writing for publication in the Review.

The Sam Allen Memorial Prize, established by the Day Division Class of 1950 in memory of their classmate, Harry Samuel Allen, is awarded annually to a member of the graduating class deemed to have demonstrated outstanding qualities of both leadership and scholarship.

The Samuel S. Levin Prize, given annually in honor of Samuel S. Levin of the Class of 1917 by his children, is awarded to the member of the graduating class deemed by the faculty to have contributed most largely to the School through his qualities of character and leadership while a student.

The Lawyers Title Insurance Corporation of Richmond, Virginia, gives an award of \$100 or its equivalent in law books to the senior student judged by the faculty most proficient in the law of Real Property.

The editors of the *United States Law Week* offer a prize of a year's subscription to the student who, in the judgment of the faculty, makes the most satisfactory scholastic progress during his final school year.

The John S. Strahorn, Jr., Memorial Prize, established by the Class of 1956 in memory of Professor John S. Strahorn, Jr., for many years a member of the faculty of the School of Law, is awarded annually to the student judged most proficient in the law of Evidence.

The Roger Howell Achievement Award, established by the Day Division Class of 1961, is presented annually to an outstanding member of the graduating class who has contributed significantly to the student activities program and whose leadership, scholarship and moral character are representative of the high ideals of the legal profession.

The Stanley L. Seligman Prize, given annually by Mr. Stanley L. Seligman of the Class of 1957, the founder of the Intra-Mural Moot Court program, is awarded to outstanding participants in that program.

ORDER OF THE COIF

The Order of the Coif is a national law school honor society, founded to encourage scholarship and to advance the ethical standards of the legal profession, membership in which depends upon high scholastic attainments. Only those students standing among the first tenth of the senior class are eligible for membership. Elections of seniors to the Maryland Chapter of the Order are held during the last semester of the school year.

Curriculum

PRACTICE COURT

The Law School endeavors not only to equip its students with an accurate knowledge of legal principles but also to train them in the application of that knowledge and to fit them for the practice of law. To that end special care and thought are devoted to the conduct of the Practice Court, which is in session throughout the scholastic year.

The work of the Practice Court is designed to afford opportunity not only for the argument of law questions, but also for preparation and conduct of a case through all its stages as nearly as possible in accordance with the procedure in actual trial and appellate work.

A set of Court Rules has been adopted in accordance with which the students are required to prepare and file their pleadings and conduct their cases. Students are furnished with statements of facts involving debatable principles of law, supposed to represent the claims of the respective parties to the litigation, from which they draft the necessary pleadings and prepare their cases for trial. They are also required to prepare and file trial briefs and appeal briefs.

The course is given in the third year of the Day School and the fourth year of the Evening School. In connection with the course instruction in Legal Ethics is offered. Except as herein otherwise provided, the course is required for graduation. There is no examination in this course, the grade of the student being based upon the work done in the Court. The grade thus attained by the student is treated in the same manner as the grade given on examination in other subjects, and the successful completion of the course gives the student credit toward his degree.

INTRAMURAL MOOT COURT COMPETITION

The Student Bar Association sponsors an Intramural Moot Court Competition, primarily for first and second year students, which is governed and administered by a Board of Student Judges. Participation is voluntary and no academic credit is awarded, but an opportunity is afforded to gain valuable experience in argument and presentation of cases and in the legal research incident thereto.

LEGAL AID CLINIC

By arrangement with the Baltimore Legal Aid Bureau, selected senior students, not exceeding twelve in any one semester, may substitute one semester's work at the Legal Aid Bureau for one semester of the Practice Court. Students taking clinic work are required to spend at least two afternoons a week at the Legal Aid Bureau, working under the supervision of a

member of the Bureau staff. The work includes consultation with clients, interviews with witnesses, preparation of memoranda, examination of records of various kinds, and in general such work as a clerk in a general office would be called upon to perform.

MARYLAND LAW REVIEW

The Maryland Law Review, appearing quarterly, is published by the Law School with the support and cooperation of the Maryland State Bar Association, the Bar Association of Baltimore City, and the Junior Bar Association of Baltimore City. The Review is devoted primarily to the discussion of Maryland law and of questions regarded as of particular interest to Maryland lawyers. Members of the Student Editorial Board may, upon the recommendation of the Faculty Advisor of the Law Review, receive semester hour credit toward the degree of Bachelor of Laws, not to exceed a total of 4 semester hours and not to exceed 2 semester hours in any one year. Such credit may be substituted, pro tanto, for work in Practice Court. Selection for the Student Editorial Board is an honor, and an opportunity for training of high value in legal research.

STUDENT BAR ASSOCIATION

The Student Bar Association is the official student organization and is affiliated with the American Law Student Association, sponsored by the American Bar Association. All students are automatically members by virtue of registration and dues are included in the Student Activities fee. Its primary purpose is to acquaint students with problems of the profession, to foster professional ideals, and to bring about closer contact with the organized bar. During the course of the year, it sponsors lectures by members of the bench and bar on various legal and professional problems, as well as various social functions and other student activities.

The Student Council functions as the executive board of the Student Bar Association and as a coordinating agency between the student body, the school administration and the faculty. Members are elected by vote of their respective classes; there is also a faculty adviser appointed by the Dean.

COMMENCEMENT

The Annual Commencement for the Session 1961-62 was held at College Park at 10:00 A.M., June 9, 1962, jointly with the other departments of the University. Thomas B. McCabe, Chairman of the Board, Scott Paper Company, delivered the annual address, and Dr. Wilson H. Elkins, President of the University, conferred the degrees.
