BODY TO STUDY STATE AGENCY SETUP NAMED

McKeldin Commission Of 12 Will Investigate Administrative Groups

[Annapolis Bureau of The Sun] Annapolis, March 3-Governor McKeldin today created a commission of inquiry to find out what the agencies of the State government do and whether they are doing it to the greatest advantage of the public which pays their bills.

At the head of the group, designated the Commission on the Administrative Organization of the State, he appointed Simon E. Sobeloff, former United States District Attorney and former city solicitor of Baltimore.

There are eleven other members representing a wide range of interests and activities, and they were given a staff of six technical and research specialists.

No Preformulated Ideas

Announcing the appointment of the commission, Mr. McKeldin said that it will set out without preformulated ideas about changes to be recommended, adding:

"It will attempt first of all to Salisbury Times. find out how the State agencies operate, what they do, and how the work of each of them relates to that of other agencies. It will try to find out how well the government serves the people of the State. The commission will begin its work without commitments of specific intentions to recommend changes in any agency or to do differently anything now being done.

"Its purpose will be to learn and to inform the people about what it learns and then in areas where changes are indicated to recommend such changes as it deems necessary."
