Punishing Involuntary Resistance, 113 Geo. L. J. (forthcoming, 2024) This work-in-progress argues that voluntariness should be an explicit, essential element of criminal offenses that proscribe resisting arrest. This intervention would reduce involuntary resisters' exposure to the harms of criminal punishment by requiring prosecutors to prove voluntariness beyond a reasonable doubt. It would also force factfinders to confront the sheer violence of arrests and the fear-inducing features of punitive and racially subordinating policing.

This paper reveals how voluntariness is not treated as an essential element of resisting offenses, despite voluntariness being a fundamental component of criminal responsibility. This requirement is particularly salient in resisting cases because, in some instances, people may involuntarily resist arrest. This contention is supported by psychological and other scientific literature regarding the emotional, physiological, and behavioral components of involuntary stress responses, such as flight or fight.
