Minute.

“The Regents of the University of Maryland, in special session, desire to put upon record their profound sense of the loss which the University under their charge has sustained in the death of its late Provost, SEVERN TEACKLE WALLIS, LL. D. Conscious of the deep interest which he always and under all circumstances manifested in the welfare of the University, they remember with special pleasure the Commencement addresses which as long as his health permitted he delivered to the successive graduating classes in Law and Medicine, and which were impressed upon all whose privilege it was to hear them, as at once lessons of profound wisdom and models of splendid oratory. They feel that his life of self-sacrifice and devotion to duty, and his readiness to strive always in behalf of right and to incur reproach and suffering in maintaining it, should furnish to the teachers and the students of this University a constant incentive to the exercise of their best powers, and an inspiration to follow always the paths of rectitude and honor in which he trod.”

He will lecture to the SENIOR CLASS on *Practice and Evidence: Text Books*, Poe on Practice; Greenleaf on Evidence.

Constitutional and Statute Law.

RICHARD M. VENABLE,

A. B. Hampden Sidney 1857; A. M. 1859; Graduate of University of Va. 1859 and 1860; LL. B. Washington and Lee University 1868.

Mr. Venable will lecture to the SENIOR CLASS on *Constitutional and Statute Law: Text Books*, Cooley on the Constitution; Bishop on the Written Law.

Commercial Law, Admiralty, and International Law.

THOMAS W. HALL.

Mr. Hall will lecture to the SENIOR CLASS on *International Law and Admiralty: Text Books*, Snow's Cases on International Law (Boston, 1893), and Woolsey's Introduction to International Law.

He will lecture to the INTERMEDIATE CLASS on *Commercial Law* (excepting Bills and Notes) and *Shipping: Text Book*, Pomeroy's Smith's Mercantile Law.

Judge Harlan will lecture to the JUNIOR CLASS on *Elementary Common Law*, and the *Law of Domestic Relations (Special Status): Text Books*, Robinson's Elementary Law; Blackstone's Commentaries; Kent's Commentaries; Stewart and Carey's Law of Husband and Wife.

Law of Personal Property and of Contracts.

WILLIAM T. BRANTLY,

A. B. Mercer University 1871; A. M. 1874; LL. B. University of Md. 1874.

Mr. Brantly will lecture to the JUNIOR CLASS on *Personal Property, Bailments and Contracts: Text Books*, 2 Kent's Commentaries, and Anson on the Law of Contract. *Reference Books*, Langdell's Cases on Contracts, and Brantly on Contracts.

Real Property and Leasehold Estates, Title to Real Property.

THOMAS S. BAER.

Mr. Baer will lecture to the JUNIOR CLASS on *Real and Leasehold Estates: Text Book*, Tiedeman on Real Property. *Reference Books*, Venable's Syllabus of the Law of Real Property; Williams on Real Property; 2 Blackstone's Commentaries.

He will lecture to the INTERMEDIATE CLASS on *Title to Real Property*: Text and Reference Books, the same.

 Law of Corporations.

B. HOWARD HAMAN,

Graduate Baltimore City College 1875; LL. B. University of Maryland 1878.

Mr. Haman will lecture to the INTERMEDIATE CLASS on the *Law of Corporations: Reference Books*, Morawetz on Corporations; Cook on the Law of Stock and Stockholders.

 Method of Instruction.

Instruction will be given by *lectures, reading and catechising*. The *lectures* are intended to present all of the leading principles of the common law applicable to the subject, and the modification of the common law by statutes, and to give illustrations of the applications of the common and statute law. Special attention is given to the statutes in force in Maryland, and to peculiarities of law in that State, where there are such; but the reasons for these statutory modifications and local peculiarities are explained, so that the student may in a short time acquaint himself with the local peculiarities of the law in any State in which he may practice.

Readings from text-books will be assigned on the subjects treated of in the lectures.

The *Catechising* at each lecture will be on the subjects discussed in the preceding lecture and on the assigned readings.

Library and Buildings.

The buildings of the several departments of the University of Maryland are all situated upon the corner of Lombard and Greene Streets, the Law School having removed to its new building there on the first of January, 1884. Connected with the lecture-hall is a large and pleasant reading-room and study for the use of students, containing a carefully selected library of text-books upon the subjects embraced in the course of study, volumes of Leading Cases, the English Common Law, United States and Maryland Reports, Digests, Statutes, etc., as well as many of the modern and best works on American and English History and Politics. The tables are supplied with the prominent Law Reviews, and the library is annually growing in size and value by the addition of new volumes.

Classes and Duration of Course.

The students attending the School are divided into *three* classes—a *Senior Class*, an *Intermediate Class*, and a *Junior Class*. The subjects of study in each class are:

JUNIOR CLASS.

First Term (Oct. to Feb.): Common Law (Elementary Law), Personal Property and Bailments and Domestic Relations.

Second Term (Feb. to June): Real Property and the Law of Contracts.

INTERMEDIATE CLASS.

First Term (Feb. to Oct.): Corporations, Executors and Administrators, Pleading and Torts.

Second Term (Feb. to June): Real Property (Title), Commercial Law, Criminal Law, Bills and Notes, and Pleading continued.

SENIOR CLASS.

First Term (Oct. to Feb.): Practice, Evidence, International Law and Admiralty.

Second Term (Feb. to June): Equity Jurisprudence and Procedure, Constitutional and Statute Law.

The lectures are all after 4 P. M. A schedule of their arrangement will be furnished at the beginning of the session.

It will be seen that the full course of study extends over three years, and the Faculty are satisfied that students who have not made considerable progress in the study of law do themselves and the Law School an injury by attempting to graduate in a shorter period. Where students can afford it, they should spend three years in the study of law. But in order to meet the case of those who cannot afford this, students are permitted to enter and take the examinations of more than one class during the same term, their fitness to complete the course in less than three years being determined by their ability to pass the regular examinations at the close of each term, and to comply with the other requirements for graduation.

Examinations, Theses and Degrees.

The Law School confers the degree of Bachelor of Laws on students who have attended the course of lectures to all three classes, have attained the required standard at the examinations, have submitted to the Faculty satisfactory theses, and argued the required number of cases in the Moot Court.

There are six examinations each session—*two* of the Senior Class, *two* of the Intermediate Class, and *two* of the Junior Class. Each class has an examination at the close of each term. The examinations are by printed questions, to be answered in

writing. Each examination is valued at 100. In order to graduate, the student must attain a grade of at least three-fourths on the questions propounded *on each distinct subject* at each examination. *This requirement will be rigidly adhered to.*

The subjects for the *theses* for the next session will be given to the students in November, 1894, and they will be expected to hand them in to the Faculty by April 1, 1895. *The attention of the students is called to the fact that the Faculty will require a high standard of excellence in the theses.*

The Faculty reserve to themselves the right to refuse a degree to any student writing an unsatisfactory thesis or neglecting the preparation and argument of the Moot Court cases, whatever grade he may have attained at the examinations.

Moot Court.

The Moot Court will meet once a week during the session, and will be presided over by one of the professors.

At the beginning of each term, the assignments in the Moot Court for that term will be announced and posted on the bulletin board in the reading room, and statements of the cases to be argued will be furnished by the Secretary of the Faculty to the students who are to take part in the argument.

Prizes and Honorable Mention.

The Faculty will, at the close of the session 1894-95, award two prizes—

1. A prize of \$100 to that member of the graduating class attaining the highest grade in the six examinations.

At the close of the session 1893-94 this prize was awarded to W. Calvin Chesnut, of Baltimore, Md., and on account of the closeness of the contest therefor, a special grade prize of \$100 was likewise awarded to W. H. DeCourcy Wright, of Baltimore, Md.

2. A prize of \$100 to that member of the graduating class who submits the best *thesis*.

At the close of the session 1893-94 this prize was awarded to William Hepburn Buckler, of Baltimore, Md., by a committee consisting of Messrs. E. J. D. Cross, John N. Steele and George R. Gaither, Jr., of the Baltimore Bar.

All members of the graduating class who have attained an average grade of 95 in the six examinations will also be honorably mentioned in the order of their standing at the Commencement.

Calendar for Session 1894-95.

SESSION AND TERMS.

The *next session* will commence on the first Monday of October (October 1), 1894, and will close on May 31, 1895. There will be a *short vacation* from December 22, 1894, to January 1, 1895, inclusive. Lectures will be suspended on legal holidays and on Easter Monday.

The session is divided into *two terms*. The *first term* extends from the beginning of the session to January 31, 1895, and the *second term* from February 1, 1895, to May 31, 1895.

COMMENCEMENT.

The Commencement will be held June 3, 1895, at 8 P. M.

Opportunities for Attending other Lectures.

All the courses upon History and Politics at the Johns Hopkins University are open to law students upon the payment of very moderate fees, and are given at hours which do not interfere with the attendance upon the lectures at the Law School.

Privileges, Courts, etc.

Any student entered in one or two classes has the privilege, if he sees fit, to be present at the lectures in the other class or classes; and any graduate of the school has the privilege of attending all the lectures for the session next ensuing his graduation.

There are seven Courts in almost continuous session in Baltimore during the entire scholastic year; the students have unusual opportunities to learn the law by attendance on the courts. Students are advised to attend the courts when they can conveniently do so, and to give careful attention and thought to the proceedings.

There is a Literary Society attached to the School, known as the Maryland University Debating Society, which is organized and conducted entirely by the students. Its discussions during the past session have been unusually interesting and instructive.

It has been the practice heretofore for students to form *Quiz Clubs*, composed of from five to ten members. They can, if properly conducted, be made very improving, and students are advised to form them.

Admission to the Bar.

Graduates of the Law Department of the University of Maryland are admitted to practice in Maryland courts on presentation of their diplomas and without examination.

Commencement.

The Annual Commencement for the session 1893-94 took place in the Lyceum Theatre, at 8 P. M., May 25, 1894. Hon. John Marshall Harlan, Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court, delivered the annual address. William T. Brantly, Esq., Provost *pro tempore* of the University, addressed the graduates in conferring the degrees, and awarded the prizes.

Fees and Expenses.

The fees for each term are payable *strictly in advance* at the commencement of each term.

The charges for instruction are as follows :

Students attending and taking the examinations of
one class,

For Term of four months,	-	-	-	\$35.
For Session of eight months,	-	-	-	\$70.

Students attending and taking the examinations of
two classes during the same term,

For Term of four months,	-	-	-	\$50.
For Session of eight months,	-	-	-	\$100.

Students attending and taking the examinations of
all three classes during the same term,

For Term of four months,	-	-	-	\$60.
For Session of eight months,	-	-	-	\$120.

Students attending and taking the examinations of any part of the course of a class will be charged the same rates as for the entire course.

There will be a Library fee of *four dollars* per annum for each student, and an additional charge of *ten dollars* to each graduate as a diploma fee.

Special arrangements may be made by members of the bar, or others, not regular students of the Law School, for attending any particular part or branch of instruction, at rates of charge in proportion to the above.

Board can be had in the city at prices varying from \$4 to \$10 per week.
