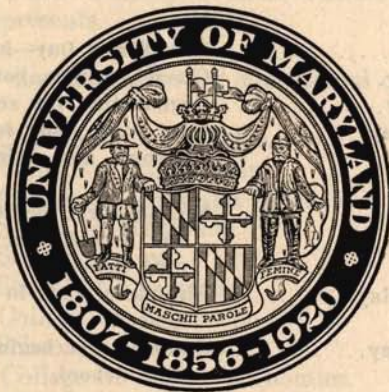

THE UNIVERSITY OF MARYLAND

Control of the University of Maryland is vested in a Board of nine Regents, appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the Senate for terms of nine years each. The general administration of the University is vested in the President. The University Council is an advisory body, composed of the President, the Assistant to the President, the Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station, the Director of the Extension Service, and the Deans. The University Council acts upon all matters having relation to the University as a whole, or to cooperative work between the constituent groups. Each school has its own Faculty Council, composed of the Dean and members of its faculty; each Faculty Council controls the internal affairs of the group it represents.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF IMPORTANT CHANGES.

The Faculty has ever been mindful of its responsibilities in the matter of improving the standards of legal education in this State. It has consistently advanced the standards of the school in all ways that seemed practicable. It is the experience of the faculty that the preparation afforded by high schools and other secondary educational institutions has become, in this day of greater complexity of modern legal regulations and expansion in the character of services which the lawyer is called upon to perform, an inadequate foundation for the study of law. The faculty believes that a greater degree of maturity of mind than is now required for law study is essential to a proper appreciation by the student of his legal training. It is the further experience of the faculty that it is impossible for the student, who is so situated that he cannot devote substantially all of his time to his studies, to obtain the greatest benefit from his law course in the period of three years. Announcement is made, therefore, in this issue of the catalog, of increased educational requirements for entrance, and a lengthening of the course of the evening school to four years instead of three, as heretofore. It is realized that there is an increasing number of students in the State who can devote substantially their entire time to law study, and who desire to acquire their degree and prepare for the Bar in a shorter period. To afford them this opportunity, announcement is made herein of a three-year course of instruction, the classes in which will be held during the day.

In announcing the above changes the faculty has acted only after most careful consideration. Its decisions are supported by the consensus of opinion of the legal profession and legal educators throughout the country. The standards announced in 1921 by the American Bar Association, which, in its opinion, law schools should maintain, and which were later endorsed by the National Conference of Bar Associations, have been or are being adopted by most of the law schools in the United States. The faculty approves of these standards, and believes that it is desirable and practicable to put them in force in this school. Their adoption enables the school to offer to its students legal education equal to that of the better law schools in other states, to gain the recognition and approval of the standardizing agencies in legal education, and to insure an increased efficiency and strengthened moral character in those applying for admission to the Bar.

HISTORICAL SKETCH.

The General Assembly of Maryland in 1812 authorized the College of Medicine of Maryland, founded in 1807, "to constitute, appoint and annex to itself, three other colleges or faculties, viz., the Faculty of Divinity, the Faculty of Law, and the Faculty of the Arts and Sciences," and declared that "the four colleges or faculties thus united, should be constituted an university by the name and under the title of the University of Maryland." In pursuance of this authority the University was organized in 1813, being one of the oldest chartered universities in America, coming eighth according to official figures.

While the first faculty of law was chosen in 1813, and David Hoffman was elected professor of law, and published in 1817 "A Course of Legal Study addressed to Students and the Profession Generally," which the *North American Review* pronounced to be "by far the most perfect system for the study of law which has ever been offered to the public" and which recommended a course of study so comprehensive as to require for its completion six or seven years, no regular school of instruction in law was opened until 1823. This was suspended in 1836 for lack of proper pecuniary support and on account of the small number of students who were able or willing to spend the time necessary, when admission to the Bar was of little difficulty, to take advantage of the course of Professor Hoffman whose ideals of legal education were far in advance of his times. In 1869 the Law School was reorganized, and in 1870 regular instruction therein was again begun. From time to time the course has been made more comprehensive and the Board of Instructors increased in number. Its graduates now number more than two thousand, and included among them are a large proportion of the leaders of the Bench and Bar of the State and many who have attained prominence in the profession elsewhere.

Two other Law Schools, the Baltimore Law School and the Baltimore University School of Law, were organized under charters granted by the State of Maryland. These two schools, both doing good work and steadily advancing their standards, were consolidated under the name of the Baltimore Law School in 1911. In 1913 the Baltimore Law School was in turn merged into the Law School of the University of Maryland. On July 1, 1920, the University of Maryland and the Maryland State College were consolidated under the name of the University of Maryland, with a view to the establishment of a strong State University with both undergraduate and professional schools.

Location and Library.

The buildings of the Medical, Legal, Dental and Pharmaceutical Departments of the University of Maryland are all located at the corner of Lombard and Greene Streets, in the City of Baltimore.

The Law Library contains an extensive collection of carefully selected text-books and treatises; the reports of the Federal District and Circuit Courts, the Supreme Court of the United States, the Court of Appeals of Maryland, and of the Courts of last resort of several other states; the English Common Law Reports; the American Digest System; all of the annotated case series, and the leading encyclopedias of law and Law Reviews. The tables are supplied with most of the current American and English legal periodicals. Many additions were made to the library during the year just passed, and ample provision has been made for its systematic betterment each year. The library now contains more than 6,000 standard volumes. It will be open for the use of the students from 10 A. M. to 10.30 P. M., and a librarian will be in charge during those hours to assist the students in finding and using the books. The students will be permitted to use the books freely in the reading room, but will not be permitted to take them from the library under any pretext whatever, and any violation of this rule will be severely punished. As the books receive considerable handling through their frequent use, the students are requested to use them with care.

The Library of the Peabody Institute and the Enoch Pratt Free Library contain many works on the law which are available to the students without charge, and students of the Law School are, under certain conditions, permitted to use the large and complete library of the Baltimore Bar.

Course of Instruction.

The course of instruction in the Law School is designed to thoroughly equip the student for the practice of his profession when he attains the Bar. Instruction is offered in the various branches of the common law, of equity, the statute law of Maryland, and the public law of the United States. The course of study embraces both the theory and practice of the law, and aims to give the student a broad view of the origin, development and function of law, together with a thorough practical knowledge of its principles and their application. Analytical study is made of the principles of substantive and procedural law, and a carefully directed practice court enables the student to get an intimate working knowledge of procedure.

Special attention is given to the statutes in force in Maryland, and to any peculiarities of the law in that State, where there are such. All of the subjects upon which the applicant for the Bar in Maryland is examined are included in the curriculum. But the curriculum includes all of the more important branches of public and private law, and is well designed to prepare the student for admission to the Bar of other states.

Arrangement of Hours.

The Law School is divided into two divisions, the Day School and the Evening School. The same curriculum is offered in each school, and the standards of work and graduation requirements are the same in each school.

The Day School course covers a period of three years of thirty-two weeks each, exclusive of holidays. The class sessions are held during the day, chiefly in the morning hours.

The Evening School course covers a period of four years of forty weeks each, exclusive of holidays. The class sessions are held on Monday, Wednesday and Friday evenings of each week from 6.30 to 9.30 P. M. This plan leaves the alternate evenings for study and preparation by the student.

Requirements for Admission.

Applicants for admission to the Law School for the next scholastic year must present evidence of good moral character, and if candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Laws must have completed at the time of admission to the School a four years' High School Course or its equivalent.

The Faculty Council will consider that students are properly qualified for entrance as candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Laws who have received a bachelor's degree from any reputable college or university, or certificate of graduation showing a successful completion of the academic course in any of the accredited Normal or High Schools of the State of Maryland, or other reputable institution of a similar character, or have certificates showing that they have passed the entrance examinations to one of the principal colleges or universities in Maryland or a college or university maintaining a standard equal thereto. In the absence of such degree or certificate, applicants for admission as a candidate for the degree of Bachelor of Laws must pass satisfactorily the entrance examinations on subjects equivalent to fifteen units, as rated by the State Board of Education.

Graduates in the commercial or business courses in High Schools, or other secondary educational institutions are not deemed qualified for admission to the Law School, and will be required to present a certificate showing the satisfactory completion of work equivalent to that required for graduation in the regular academic courses of such schools.

Changes in Entrance Requirements.

Announcement is made of the following changes in the entrance requirements, effective as stated below:

- (a) Students entering in the fall of 1926, as applicants for a degree, shall be required to produce evidence of the completion of at least one year of college work, or such work as would be accepted for admission to the second or sophomore year in the College of Liberal Arts of an accredited college or university in this state.
- (b) Students entering in the fall of 1927, as applicants for a degree, shall be required to produce evidence of the completion of at least two years of college work, or such work as would be accepted for admission to the third or junior year in the College of Liberal Arts of an accredited college or university in this state.
- (c) **Special Students**—A limited number of students applying for entrance with less than the academic credit required of candidates for the law degree, who are over twenty-one years of age, and who, in the opinion of the Faculty Council, possess special qualifications for the study of law, may be admitted as candidates for the certificate of the school, but not for the degree.

Combined Program of Study Leading to the Degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Laws.

The University of Maryland offers a combined program in arts and law which will be started in the fall of 1925, leading to the degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Laws.

Students pursuing this combined program in college and pre-legal subjects will spend the first three years in the College of Arts and Sciences at College Park. The fourth year they will register in the Law School, and upon the successful completion of the work of the first year in the Day School, or the equivalent work in the Evening School, the degree of Bachelor of Arts will be awarded. The degree of Bachelor of Laws will be awarded upon the completion of the work prescribed for graduation in the School of Law.

A similar arrangement exists whereby the combined course is offered in conjunction with St. John's College, at Annapolis.

Details of the combined courses may be had upon application to the University of Maryland, College Park, Md., and St. John's College, Annapolis, Md.

Pre-Legal Work.

The Faculty earnestly advises high school graduates who contemplate the study of law to postpone their entrance into the Law School, where their circumstances permit, until they have completed at least two years of college work.

At the present time the University is offering, through extension courses and in the various schools located in Baltimore, courses which will enable a prospective law student to meet the advanced entrance requirements of the Law School. This work is under the immediate direction of the Dean of the School of Business Administration, and particulars concerning same may be had from him upon request.

Advanced Standing.

Students complying with the requirements for admission to the school who have, in addition, successfully pursued the study of law elsewhere in an accredited law school, may, upon presentation of a certificate from such accredited law school showing his honorable dismissal therefrom, and the successful completion of equivalent courses therein, covering at least as many hours as are required for such subjects in this school, receive credit for such courses and be admitted to advanced standing. No credit will be given for study pursued in a law office, and no degree will be conferred until after one year of residence and study at this school.

Registration.

All students are required when entering for each session to report at the office of the Registrar, located in the Law building, Lombard and Greene Streets, in person and enroll. Each student will receive a Class Card, stating his registration and payment of fees. This card will be necessary in order to obtain admission to the lectures. The date of enrollment for each session will be noted, and names not upon the register will not be placed upon the class rolls. The stipulated period of attendance upon the Law School for the purpose of graduation, and for insertion in the certificate required to take the examination for admission to the bar before the State Board of Law Examiners, will be calculated from the register, and the class rolls made therefrom.

The attention of all students is called to the fact that no registration will be allowed except by special action of the Faculty Council after the last day for registration as designated in the Calendar.

Students who fail to pay the tuition and other fees required on or before the last day of registration, for each term or semester, as stated in the catalogue, will be required to pay as an addition to the fees required the sum of Five (\$5.00) Dollars, and if the payment so required shall not be paid before twenty (20) days from the beginning of said term or semester, the student's name shall be stricken from the rolls.

(The tuition fee for students who were registered for the session 1924-1925, and are going on with the Senior courses remains as heretofore.)

An additional tuition fee of \$50.00 per annum must be paid by students who are non-residents of the State of Maryland.

The tuition fee is payable in two equal instalments, one-half at the time of registration for the First Term, and one-half at the time of registration for the Second Term.

The matriculation fee is not subject to rebate. In cases of total withdrawal from the school, a pro-rata return of the tuition fee may be authorized by the Dean. When a rebate is authorized, it will be reckoned from the end of the month in which the Dean receives notice from the student.

Students who have attended the Law School but have failed of graduation, and who, as candidates for a degree, are required to complete certain courses, must register at the beginning of the term in which such courses are given, and pay a fee of \$10 for each course so taken. No student will be permitted to take the examination in any course without having registered and paid the fee.

Special arrangements may be made by members of the Bar, or others, not regular students of the Law School, for attending any particular part or branch of instruction at rates of charge in proportion to the above.

Privileges, Courts, Etc.

There are ten Courts in almost continuous session in Baltimore during the entire scholastic year; the students have unusual opportunities to learn the law by attendance on the Courts and are advised to attend the Courts when they can conveniently do so, and to give careful attention and thought to the proceedings.

It has been the practice heretofore for students to form Quiz Clubs, composed of from five to ten members. They can, if properly conducted, be made very improving, and students are advised to form them.

CURRICULUM.

The curriculum has been rearranged for the Day School and for the four-year Evening School.

The program of work for the first year in each of these schools, as it will be offered for the next scholastic year, is given below. The instructors for the courses in the Day School and the books to be used in both schools will be announced later.

Day School.

- Torts**—One and one-half hours first term, two and two-thirds hours second term—Five points credit—**Judge Frank.**
- Criminal Law**—Two and one-fourth hours first term—Three points credit—**Mr. O'Dunne.**
- Personal Property**—One and one-half hours first term—Two points credit—**Mr. Dennis.**
- Real Property I**—Three hours second term—Four points credit—**Mr. Freeman.**
- Legal Bibliography**—One hour second term—One point credit—
Instructor to be announced.

SECOND AND THIRD YEARS.

The courses as offered heretofore in the Intermediate and Senior classes will be continued for the next scholastic year without change. For the year following the courses will be rearranged, but all courses now offered will be retained. It is planned to add several new courses to the curriculum, so that second and third year students in the Day School, and third and fourth year students in the Evening School, may, under proper direction, select his program of study.

The Law School endeavors not only to thoroughly equip its students with an accurate knowledge of legal principles, but also to train them in the application of that knowledge and fit them for the practice of the law. To that end, special care and thought are devoted to the conduct of the Practice Court, which is in session throughout the scholastic year.

The work of the Practice Court is designed to afford opportunity not only for the argument of law questions, but also for the preparation and conduct of a case through all its stages, as nearly as possible in accordance with the procedure in actual trial work. Three features are especially emphasized, viz: the drawing of pleadings, the writing of briefs, and the oral argument of questions of law.

A set of Court Rules has been adopted in accordance with which the students are required to prepare and file their pleadings and conduct their cases. Students are furnished with statements of facts, involving debatable principles of law, supposed to represent the claims of the respective parties to the litigation, from which they draft the necessary pleadings and prepare their cases for trial. They are thus enabled to familiarize themselves with the practical duties of court practice to an extent which the mere argument of mooted questions of law does not afford. The cases assigned are such as to illustrate the principles involved in all the courses covered by the curriculum, particularly those of Pleading and Practice.

Students are required to prepare and file trial briefs and appeal briefs, which must be prepared in accordance with approved legal practice. The students are required to show familiarity with all important authorities relating to the questions discussed in both briefs and oral arguments, and the authorities relied upon must be carefully studied and effectively presented.

The course extends through the second and third years of the Day School and the third and fourth years of the Evening School. Attendance at all sessions of the Practice Court by members of those classes is compulsory. Except by affirmative vote of the Fac-

ulty Council, no student will receive credit for work in the Practice Court unless he has attended at least seventy-five per cent. of the sessions each year. There is no examination in this course, the grade of the student being based upon the work done in the Court and his attendance. The grade thus attained by the student is treated the same as the grade given on examination in other subjects. The successful completion of the course gives the student a credit of four points toward his degree.

During the course lectures are delivered by the Director on Legal Ethics, preparation of briefs and trial practice.

GRADUATION.

The Law School confers the degree of Bachelor of Laws upon students of good moral character who have met the entrance requirements for candidates for the degree; and have satisfactorily completed three years of resident law work in the Day School, or four years of resident law work in the Evening School, as prescribed by the regulations; and have submitted to the Faculty Council a satisfactory thesis. The work required for the degree consists of seventy-eight points, each point representing the satisfactory completion of work requiring class-room attendance one hour a week for one term. This requirement may be met in the Day School by a program embracing the prescribed work of the first year, and a minimum of 12 hours of class work per week and the work of the Practice Court through the second and third years; in the Evening School by a program embracing the prescribed work in the first two years, and a minimum of eight and one-half hours of class work per week and the work of the Practice Court through the third and fourth years.

All students are required to take the work in the Practice Court, and a credit of four points towards the degree may be earned by its successful completion.

Only those courses in which the student receives a grade of 75 or better may be counted towards the degree, except that in the courses taken by the student in the third year of the Day School or the fourth year of the Evening School, one grade of not less than 50 may be counted towards the degree, provided the general average of the student is 80 or more.

The requirements for graduation as above stated apply only to students entering the school for the first time in the 1925-1926 session. Students who were registered in the school during the last scholastic year must meet the requirements for graduation and the rules and regulations as set out in the catalogue for the scholastic year 1924-1925.

EXAMINATIONS AND GRADES.

1. Written examinations are held at the end of each term for each class on the subjects given during that term, and deficiency examinations are held during the week preceding the opening of the fall term.

2. All students, unless excused by the Dean, must present themselves for examination in all subjects for which they are registered at the first regular examination held therein.

3. Except by affirmative vote of the Faculty Council, no student will be permitted to take the examination in any course unless he has attended at least 75 per cent. of the lectures therein.

4. Each examination is valued at 100, and a grade of 75 is required to pass. The grades will be reported to the student in writing as soon as possible after each term.

5. No student may receive credit for any course in which he has failed unless within two years of such failure he receives a passing mark in that subject.

6. Upon failing the second time in the examination in any two subjects, a student will not be permitted to continue his course at the Law School.

7. A student will be required to repeat the entire work of a class unless he has successfully completed a sufficient number of the courses taken as to insure, in the judgment of the Faculty Council, the ability to proceed satisfactorily with the work of the next higher class.

8. The Faculty Council reserves the right to require the withdrawal of any student from either school whose continued presence there would not, in the judgment of the Council, be of benefit to himself or would be detrimental to the best interests of the school.

9. DEFICIENCY EXAMINATIONS—Students who have failed to pass the regular examination in a course offered in the first two years of the Day School or in the first three years of the Evening School; students admitted to advanced standing; and students who have been excused from taking the regular examination when given, may take the deficiency examination in such courses.

Application to take the deficiency examination to be held beginning Monday, September 7th, must be filed with the Dean on or before Monday, August 31st. A fee of \$5.00 for each subject to be taken must accompany the application.

Thesis.

Each candidate for a degree must prepare a satisfactory type-written thesis of not less than three thousand words on some legal topic to be selected by the Faculty Council. This thesis must represent original investigation on the part of the student. In no case will a mere compilation of authorities be accepted. Theses must be handed in on or before April 1st of the year in which the degree is to be granted. Each writer must attach to it a sealed envelope containing his name. The attention of the students is called to the fact that the Faculty will require a high standard of excellence in the theses.

Honors and Prizes.

In the year 1926 two prizes of \$100 each will be awarded:

One to the student of the graduating class who obtains the highest average grade for the entire course, and one to the student of the graduating class who submits the most meritorious thesis.

Each year four students in the Practice Court are assigned, on the basis of their work in the Practice Court, to the Honor Case which is tried at the end of the year. The Alumni Association of the Law School offers a prize of \$50.00 to the student so assigned, who, on the trial of the case, has the best argument and manner of presentation.

Scholarships.

Mr. Louis S. Ashman, of the Baltimore Bar and an alumnus of the Law School, has assigned to the Regents all royalties to be derived from a law book published by him under the title "Prayers and Instructions."

The interest from the fund thus established is to be used to provide a scholarship or scholarships to be known as "The Louis S. Ashman Scholarship," carrying tuition only in the Law School for a student or students recommended annually by the Faculty Council as worthy to receive the same by scholarly attainments and the need of financial assistance in pursuing the study of law.

Scholarships will be awarded for one year only; but the same person may receive more than one award provided his scholastic work and influence in the School are such as to merit this distinction.

Until the royalties provide a fund the income of which shall be sufficient to equal the tuition fees of at least one student, Mr. Ashman will annually supply a sum equivalent to the tuition fees of one student.

For the last scholastic year the scholarship was awarded to Francis Hall Hammond, of the Senior Class.

Admission to the Bar.

Under the rules governing admission to the Bar in the State of Maryland, each applicant is required to register with the Court of Appeals as a law student before beginning the study of law. A high school education or its equivalent is required of all applicants for registration as a law student. Application blanks for such registration may be procured from the Registrar by the student at the time of his registration in the Law School. A fee of \$5.00, payable to the Clerk of the Court of Appeals must accompany each application.

Applicants for admission to the Bar must have studied law in the office of a member of the Bar of this State or in a law school of the United States for at least three years, and must file a petition with the Court of Appeals at least ten days before the day fixed for the examination they wish to take. A fee of \$25.00, payable to the Court of Appeals, must accompany each application.

Admission to the Bar is upon examination by the State Board of Law Examiners. The examinations are held in June and November of each year, and embrace the following subjects: Agency, Conflict of Laws, Constitutional Law, Contracts, Corporations, Criminal Law, Domestic Relations, Equity, Evidence, Negotiable Instruments, Personal Property, Pleading and Practice at Law and in Equity, Public Service Companies, Real Property, Torts, Wills and Administration of Estates. All of the required courses are included in the curriculum offered by the Law School.

Further information concerning the examinations or matters relating to admission to the Bar may be had upon application to Mr. William L. Rawls, Secretary, State Board of Bar Examiners, 701 Maryland Trust Bldg., Baltimore.

COMMENCEMENT.

The Annual Commencement for the session 1924-25 was held at the Lyric at 4 P. M., June 6, 1925, jointly with the other departments of the University located in Baltimore. Hon. Huston Thompson delivered the annual address, and Albert F. Woods, A.M., D.Agr., President of the University, conferred the degrees and awarded the prizes.
